Fish Hatcheries in Ogden Valley Carried Away at a Loss Of \$50,000.

WHOLE COUNTRY INUNDATED.

Bridges Washed Away-Roads Impassable and Traffic Suspended-People priven From Their Homes,

Ogden, Feb. 6 .- A telephone message from Huntsville is to the effect that the heavy rains and thaw of this week are doing no end of damage in Ogden valky. The greatest damage done is to the fish hatchery business, which had ley. The greatest damage done is to ley. The greatest damage done is to the fish hatchery business, which had grown to considerable proportions. The sumage to this industry will reach per-laps \$30,000 alone; all of the hatcheries had many thousand trout on hand. The hod waters increased so rapidly that the owners of the hatcheries could not cope with them, and the hatcheries of all the companies but the Rocky Mountain Trout company were practically wiped avag, carrying several hundred thou-sud trout of from two to ten inches in leigh down the stream. The storm also did great damage to the roadway, making it almost impossible for any-cite to travel from the valley to Ogden. One of the bridges over the north fork of the Ogden river just west of Hunts-rille was swept away by the rushing stream of water that has swollen to alsming proportions, and several smaller wagon bridges over canals and other branches of the river have been carried away. It is also reported that the new steel bridges outil last year over the north and south forks of Og-den river are in danger of being washed
