DENIES THAT HE IS A CZAR.

Washington, Dec. 9 .- Speaker Canson tday declared that never since 1890, had there been a time when, unerd the rules of the house, either un der Republican or Democratic control. a majority of members had not been able to register their will in legislation. He made the assertion in speaking to a delegation of the Ohio Valley Improvement association, which through its chairman, presented him with a memorial urging the improvement of the Ohio river at a cost of

ment of the Ohio river at a cost of \$63,000,000, to be paid in bonds. "I appreciate," said Mr. Cannon, "that you approach me because I am gpeaker. In the swing of the twentieth century, I have no doubt that these will be avanded no doubt that there will be expended no less than ten thousand million dol-lars in the improvement of the water-

lars in the improvement of the water-ways of the country, but of necessity some of this work must be done by those who must follow after us." Washington, Dec. 9.—The session of the senate today was chiefly de-voted to the formal presentation of departmental reports and the intro-duction of bills. The reports have been made public from time to time and the bills, numbering 352, were chiefly for the granting of pensions. Senator Johnston of Alabama intro-duced a bill to reinstate former Cadets Russell and Weaver, dismissed from Russell and Weaver, dismissed from the military academy for hazing. He declared that their punishmeut was excessive, and said that every new senator, was hazed by being given 'unimportant assignments and being pastricted in his privilence He did not restricted in his privileges. He did not wish to have the idea go forth that boys' mothers have to look after them after they enter the military academy.

After a brief excutive session the senate, at 11:22 o'closk, adjourned.

Washington, Dec. 9.—The annual report of Mr. Cortelyou, the secretary of the treasurer, shows a reversal of conditions for the fiscal year 1908, as compared with the fiscal year 1907. For the later year the receipts were \$84,236,586 in excess of the disbursements. For the fiscal year 1908 the disbursements were \$58,070,201 in excess of the receipts, due to business depression and increased appropriations. The receipts from internal revenue taxes for the fiscal year tecrease from 1908 were \$251,711,126, a net decrease from 1907 of \$17,955,646. The customs receipts for the same period amounted to \$286,113,-130, a net decrease for the year of about \$46,000,000. \$46,000,000.
