WE were much shocked yesterday by receiving the sad intelligence of the sudden demise of BrotherL. BARNABAS ADAMS. The news will be startling to the entire community, to whom Bro. Adams was almost universally known. He afterwards complained of a pain in the the atterwards complained of a pain in the chest; to relieve the pain he drank some composition tes, and afterwards remarked that he felt better. While the pain remain-ed he did not desist from working, and neither himself nor his men whom he had assisting him supposed that it was any-thing serious. He sat down to dinner yes-terday, and while in the act of eating he fell over and when raised up he merely gasped once or twice and his spirit took its flight. This was at ten minutes to 2 o'clock. He was a faithful, kind hearted, unobtru-sive, industrious man, and was much re-spected and beloved by a large circle of acquaintances. He was born in Upper Canada, of Vermont parents, and was edu-cated in the Methodist faith, several of his immediate relatives being preachers in that denomination. He joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, we think under the ministry of John E. Page, when he was 23 years of age. It not being con-venient for him to emigrate to Kirtland, when his brother Arza, (who now resides Kimbal L Lake E D venient for him to emigrate to Kirtland, when his brother Arza, (who now resides at American Fork) did, he afterwards gath-ered with the Saints in Missouri, in what was known as the Canada camp, which was led there by John E. Page. In company with his brethren and sisters he was ex-pelled from that State by mobecratic vio-lence and he settled with the Saints in Illinois. When compelled by the ruthless hand of persecution to leave Illinois, he came west, and, at an early day, set-tled in this city, where he has contied in this city, where he has con-tinued to reside ever since. We think it was on Monday that we saw him in this office, and had a lengthy conversation with him. He came for the purpose of having a paper sent to a younger brother of his, a lawyer, who resides in Sarnia, Canada. He seemed uncommonly interested in con-versing about his family and friends, and his conversation secured our undivided at-tention. While with him we mentally re-marked that we never shy Bro. Adams look to such advantage as he did then, and it would have been difficult for us then to have thought that his stay among us was only to be for a few brief hours longer. He appeared vigorous and healthy and his manner was more than usually animated. We deeply sympathize with his family and relatives, upon whom his sudden demise will fall very unexpectedly; but that God, whom Barnabas L. Adams has faithfully served, will sustain and comfort them.
