AN ENGAGEMENT FOUGHT.

The Marshals Overpowered and Compelled to Retreat.

TWO PRISONERS CAPTURED.

A Runner that These were Hanged by the Outlaws was Confirmed.

New Laredo, Mex., Dec. 24.—The Mexican revolutionists have committed another bold outrage on United States soil. A lengthy dispatch received here today from Guerrero states that reliable information has been received there of an engagement in Juarez county, Texas, between a posse of United States Marshals and about 500 revolutionists, which resulted in the defeat of the marshals and the capture of two of the latter, who are being held as prisoners by the outlaws. Last Wednesday this posse left camp about five miles below El Paso and made a raid upon a rancho. They captured Juan Palacios, one of the leaders of the recent revolutionary movement, and started back to the camp with him.

Friday morning the camp of the deputy marshals was attacked by about 500 well-armed revolutionists. The deputy marshals made a desperate resistance, but were overpowered and compelled to retreat. The revolutionists released Palacios and captured two deputy marshals. It is reported that a runner from the camp of the revolutionists, who was wounded and that three United States deputies were wounded. There is also a rumor that the deputy marshals were taken prisoners and hanged by the revolutionists. The bodies being buried with bullets. No confirmation of this has been received. It is understood that the federal authorities in Laredo have received full particulars of the fight, and are preparing to send a posse to the place in which the fight took place, which they are arranging for capturing the desperate band may be carried out successfully.
