How the Burned and Sunken "Rimac" was Navigated by the Chilians.

On July 14th, 1880, the Chilean transport *Rimac*, an iron screw steamer of 1,227 tons, carrying a regiment of cavalry and a valuable cargo, was captured by the Peruvian corvette *Union* and taken to Callao. After the Peruvian defeat at Chorrillos and Miraflores, the *Rimac* was burned and sunk. Recently the hulk was raised by the Chilians, and it was found that although severely damaged, it could be rendered serviceable, and that the machinery was only slightly injured. Every particle of woodwork was burned out of her, and she presented more the appearance of an empty, fire worn stove than of a vessel with which the sea could be navigated.

struggle, short and sharp, and when it is over the men on the landing are in custody and disarmed. They are handcuffed and led out prisoners of war. The house is now garrisoned in the interest of the landlord, and the troops reform and march off the ground with their prisoners. All this, I think, leads to the conclusion that if dramatists who now write "powerful Irish plays" would give up attempting to invent sensation scenes and stick to the facts as we have them now they would produce plays intensely sensational and at the same time rigidly true to real life."
