PLAIN CITY, Dec. 26, 1887.

Editor News:—A serious and fatal accident happened a short distance south of this place, yesterday. The Weber river has risen very rapidly of late, and has overflowed its banks so that the water is nearly as high as it was last Spring when at its highest. The "Four Mile Creek" has overflowed, so that last evening the water was about three feet on the top of the bridge. Early this morning, the report came to the settlement that a team had been drowned in Sand Creek yesterday evening. The citizens rushed to the spot and found that a Mr. John James, of Willard, Box Elder County, and his wife, had attempted to drive over the bridge, got too high up, went off the bridge, and the man, the woman and the team were drowned. The bodies were found and taken to Blattersville, where relatives of the deceased reside, and to which place Mr. and Mrs. James were going. This should be a warning to all persons not to drive into places with which they are unacquainted and do not know the way out of.
