HOODOO AUTO.

Once More Famous Motor Car is Re sponsible for a Blaze.

The blacksmith shop owned by Oblad & Knight, at 145 east First South street, had a narrow escape from destruction by fire shortly after 1 o'clock this

morning. Only the timely discovery of the blaze and the prompt response of the firemen and their quick and ef-fective work saved the building. A hoodoo automobile was responsible for the fire. It was the same machine that exploded at the Miller hotel a few weeks ago and caused an alarm of fire The auto was taken to the blacksmith shop a day or two ago for repairs. It was holsted up stairs to the paint shop and yesterday a workman took the machine to pieces and piled up some oll and gasoline soaked waste in the corner of the shop. This stuff ignited, it is supposed, from spontaneous combus-tion, and in a few minutes the roof was ablaze. A street car man who happened to be passing, saw the flames and quickly notified the fire department across the street. Almost before the echo of the big gong had died away, the firemen were dashing across the street with the chemical, and extin-guished the blaze without the use of the

big hose The heat was very intense, and besides practically destroying the automobile, did considerable damage to

Automobile, did considerable daimage to several newly painted vehicles. A new wagon owned by the Franklin Candy company, had just been painted white with gold decorations. After the blaze the rig was a beautiful yellow. All this work will have to be done over. A hole was burned in the roof of the building, and the floor was somewhat damaged. Had the fire reached the paint and varnish stacked in one cor-ner of the room, that entire building might have been destroyed. 'Chief Devine estimates the loss on

"rother of Bishop George Romney Passes Suddenly Away in Mexico.

MILES ROMNEY DEAD.

Advices from Mexico tell of the death at Dublan, Chihuahua, Feb. 26, of Elder Miles P. Romney, brother of Bishop George Romney and a well known and highly respected resident of that section. The demise of Elder Romney was very sudden. He was president of the High Priests' quorum of the Juarez Stake, and in this capacity had just returned from a ten days' trip among the settlements of Sonora, feeling very tired. At 9 o'clock in the evening he retired, quite unwell, and a few minutes later was selzed with a pain in the region of the heart. Fearing he was going to die he asked his wife to

send for the rest of the family, but before they arrived he had passed to the great beyond.

great beyond. Miles P. Romney was born in Nau-voo, II., August 18, 1843, being, there-fore, in his sixty-first year. He came to Utah in 1850, where he lived until about 25 years ago, when he moved to Arizona, and in 1885 he went to Mexico. He was an honest, consistent Latter-day Saint, and had filled two missions, one to England in 1862, and the other to the northwestern states in 1875. He to the northwestern states in 1875. H leaves a large family, besides two brothers, Bishop, George Romney of this city, and Thomas Romne, of Mon. tana.
