Stewart of Warren, Weber county, returned Sept. 11, 1904, from the British mission, where he has from the British mission, where he has been laboring since April 11, 1902, in the Newcastle conference. Elder John T. Corbridge of Layton Davis county, was set apart June 21 1901, and returned Sept. 12, 1904, from Society islands, where he has been laboring in the Tuamotuano and Gam-bier conferences. Dear Brother-I have to thank you for the seventy-fourth annual report of the Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ, held at Salt Lake City, which has been lately received by me which has been circulated amongst the members for perusal.

The discourses are very edifying and instructive and have no doubt benefited all and been a source of much joy and consolation to those far away from the body of the Church, especially after the great furore made against God's Church and people to bring them into discredit and lower them in the eyes of the world. India has not escaped the con-tagion, but has published her quota of es, with "embellishments" by way o diversion. Bro. Lilley wrote to the leading papers contradicting the falsehods published,

I regret to say that there have been no additions to the branch here since Elder Cooper's departure, although many believe in the doctrines of the Church: occasionally we have a few outsiders at our meetings. The people (most of them) are very callous and indifferent regarding all matters of religion and are given solely to the en-joyment of the pleasures of this world. Tracts, however, have been freely dis-tributed and the Gospel of Jesus Christ made known to a number of people some of whom it would have been difficult to reach in any other way-such as the commissioner of Sind and the bishop of Lahore and other leading gentle men. I have no doubt much good will result from it later on, although at present the benefit cannot be seen.

FROM MISSISSIPPI.

Once Flourishing Branch at Ack. erman Now Widely Scattered.
