

Who is Mrs. Ronalds?

An American Woman Who is a Social Leader in Edward's Set—Once a Boston Girl, but in Her Thirty Years Abroad She Has Become the Good Friend of the King and Queen.

The cable the other day flashed to America the news, which was conspicuously and quite generally printed, that Mrs. Ronalds, an American, had entertained Edward VII, king of England, at her residence in London.

Straightaway there was much racking of Yankee memories.

"Mrs. Ronalds," said the reading public meditatively, "who's Mrs. Ronalds? We've often heard of Mrs. George Cornwallis West, and many other American women in the king's set, but who is Mrs. Ronalds?"

Mrs. Lenhard Ronalds, she who was Mrs. Frances Carter of Boston, is one of the most significant figures in London society. She is "my good friend" to the king; "dear Mrs. Ronalds" to "yours affectionately, Alexandra," center of the American colony, and "savior" to the American and other aspirants for social assistance in England's capital.

Last, but not least, she is patron to every struggling, deserving musician who comes within her ken. Her famous "at home" is gorgeously sprinkled with titled folk, and probably comes as near to the old-fashioned saloons of the Mary Wortley Montagu days in social influence as it is possible to approach in the prosaic reign of Edward VII.

IN AMERICA THIRTY YEARS AGO.

Mrs. Ronalds has spent, most of the last 30 years in London and Paris. She went back to New York in the early

seventies, many one of the Lenhard family. The many developments of that marriage resulted in her joining her mother in Europe, and joining her for good.

With her children—one of these the clever Mrs. Ritchie of today—the rich American took up her residence in Cadogan place, London. She has lived there ever since, or, more accurately, No. 7 has been her "official" residence, and the continent in general her occasional abode. Few women are more widely traveled, and know the continent more intimately than does "Fanny" Ronalds.

Mrs. Ronalds's house in Cadogan place is nothing much to look at from the outside, for it is in the way many famous London houses have. It might be a boarding house for all that would be discernible to the passing stranger who did not happen to know that Cadogan place is in the heart of fashionable London. Mrs. Ronalds's house is held in on every hand by the homes of titled folk—homes equally forbidding without, but rich and beautiful within.

If Mrs. Ronalds's boudoir were lifted out bodily, it would sell to any one for a dozen times its value. It is a masterpiece of the art of collecting. The autograph hunter, for instance, would find the king's handwriting a dozen times over. The queen's latest likeness would be at a high premium for the sake of the Christmas message on the envelope. Mrs. Ronalds's house is a treasure house of the kind. It is a good one, naturally, since Mrs. Ronalds lets it stop in her house.

A WONDERFUL MUSIC ROOM.

Mrs. Ronalds's music room is even more interesting than the boudoir, for it contains the priceless legacies in manuscript and instrument which Sir Arthur Sullivan left to the woman whom he was pleased to honor with his special friendship.

The music room, one of those little places which make up in meaning what they lack in size, contains, among the other Sullivan relics, the original manuscript of "The Lost Chord," as well as several of Sir Arthur's opera scores. One thing in the room which Mrs. Ronalds says she "merely bought," is a huge gramophone, quite the biggest thing of its kind. It is a good one, naturally, since Mrs. Ronalds lets it stop in her house.

The Ronalds's music room has been reduced to science by the executive ability and long experience of the famous American hostess. Great artists from the Royal Opera House, who charge William Waldorf Astor and other folk \$1,000 a song at private entertainments, sing for friendship at Mrs. Ronalds's. Therefore, struggling geniuses, who need only a social lift to make a name for themselves, feel that they have as good as "arrived" when they can get Mrs. Ronalds's "merely bought" gramophone. It costs \$75,000 to be properly "launched" through a musical agent in London. But an official appearance at one of Mrs. Ronalds's "at home" is worth more to a struggling artist than a dozen paid agents. On the

hand, all sorts of peacocks and other personages through the Cadogan place, because they can be sure of hearing or seeing some public in audience of the great general public.

Aside from her musical efforts, Mrs. Ronalds's social success in London is due to several causes.

First, she entered the arena under the wing of Mrs. George Cornwallis West, Lady Randolph Churchill. Lady Randolph literally paved the way for almost every American woman who has taken English honors on herself since that time. Mrs. Ronalds found Lady Randolph Churchill's help amazingly availed. The two women have kept their cordial friendship up to the present time. A second factor in Mrs. Ronalds's rise has been a plentiful purse and her ability to entertain uncommonly well. She entertains her guests in her house. Third, Mrs. Ronalds has succeeded, because she is a thoroughly charming woman. She is no longer young, but even now there are considerably more than a few traces of what must have been her extraordinary youthful beauty. She has a fine profile, excellent clear skin and the kindest of smiles.

There is a whisper to the effect that Mrs. Horace Townsend, latest American ripple on the English social scene, is largely indebted to Mrs. Ronalds for her introduction at court. The two are great friends, and were seen together frequently during the Belgian minister's wife's recent stay in London. And, as everybody knows, there is no truer to her American friends or more willing to let them profit by her London position than Mrs. Ronalds.

ONE OF MRS. RONALDS'S LITTLE KNACKS.

One of Mrs. Ronalds's little knacks lies along the lines of the American cocktail. She proved to the satisfaction of last year's Coronation bazaar that she knows how to mix the American drink well. Mrs. Ronalds presided over the American bar, and she put in about as heavy an amount of work as the most valiant American woman is capable of. She didn't just superintend; she pitched in and did things herself. And a lot of respect she received for her.

Mrs. Ronalds's life in London has been singularly lacking in reverses, socially speaking. Ronalds stock has, as it were, seldom fluctuated.

In dress, Mrs. Ronalds displays very good taste. She does not affect any neglige, even when working in her

boudoir. Instead, she employs a close fitting work-a-day dress of black broadcloth. Her street gowns are usually of blue and white, and her evening apparel has a little fluff on it as she quite demands. Her thick, dark hair, dressed with very much of a bang, is worn in a net.

When not holding an "at home," Mrs. Ronalds's only ornament is a long chain of blue and white beads, with which she is especially fond of playing as she talks. When entertaining, only a few fine jewels are tastefully displayed.
