BRIDGE 18 HELD.

Must Answer to the District Court for Assault.

The preliminary hearing of Joseph Bridge, a man 35 years of age, charged with ravishing Helen Lucille Budd, a 10-year-old giri, was taken up in Judge Timmony's court this morning. Assistant County Attorney Loofbourow conducted the prosecution, while the accused was represented by Judge Wenger. The facts brought out by the testimony of the little girl and two other witnesses, are so revolting that they are unfit for publication. It is alleged that the crime was committed on July 1st down near the Jordan river,

a mile south of the copper plant. The child was very much frightened while on the witness stand, but told of the assault upon her by Bridge. Andrew Galland and Clarence Galland, both testified that they saw the defend-ant commit the crime on the afternoon of the date mentioned in the complaint. Their testimony was unshaken on cross

examination. They were both positive in their statements and were sure Bridge was the man. The child's mother testified that Helen complained to her of being sick, and after doing what she could for her

Son. Two individuals in the exact form and likeness of each other. Christ took upon Him flesh and blood and "became like His brethren in all things except He was without sin. He died and was raised from the dead and with His glorified body "sat down at the right hand of the Father." Christ re vealed the Father in His own person, telling His desciples "He that hath me hath seen the Father." He de clared that His Father is our Father and His God our God. The spirit of man is a spark from the eternal flame of Diety. It is the spirit of man that thinks, that acts, that gains intelligence and experience and when th body decays, the spirit is unchanged and when the body returns to the dust. the spirit remains intact. The mortal spirit, which is the son of God. retains the impressions gained while in the body. The intelligence thus acquired will never depart from it. The hope and promise to the sons of God in this life is, that when it is over they

shall behold the face of God and see Him as He is. The speaker turned his attention to the orthodox Christian notion in regard to Diety, which is that God is "with passions out body, parts or The inconsistency of this motion was showed up by calling attention to the many contradictory elements in the theory. For instance it is declared that God has no parts, yet He is declared to have three parts, viz: the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and one of these parts has a body. He is said to have no passions, yet He is describ-ed to be a God of love, and is angry with the wicked; that He "loves righteousness and hates iniquity." The peaker then brought up the evidences f God's personality from passages in he Bible and in modern revelation. We believe that if men ask they shall receive, if they seek they shall find, as much today as at any former period.

The knowledge that the Latter-day Saints have of the truth has come down to them from the Father of lights. No man without the Spirit of God can con prehend Him or His works. But His spirit reveals the things of God. The spirit of light is everywhere pres-
