Officials to Meet in Few Days-Prince Consolidated in Rich Ore-Centennial is Busy.

Within a few days Senator William Route; J. Ross Clark, vice presidnt of road at Ploche, Nev. The road will be from the Pioche station out to the to the Prince Consolidated mine, south-west of the city of Pioche. It will be about eight and a half miles long.

Engineer Knowles, who has been in the Pioche district considerably of late looking over the survey that has been made, returned from the district yesterday. Within a few days a new postoffice station will be located near the Prince Consolidated mine. The station will be the mailing center for the Prince Consolidatde, which has 50 at work the Gold and Silver Prince, the Golden Prince, the Centennial Ploche, the Ploche King, the Demijohn, the East Prince and a number of other active members of the district.

William Lloyd, superintendent of the Prince Consolidated mine and Ernest A. Hodges, manager of one of the largest mercantile establishments in Pioche, came in from the district this morning. They were full of good things about Pioche and its mines and declare the big day for the camp is

"At the Prince mine we have struck the strong bedded vein from the 400 level in an upraise from the 500 level," declared Mr. Lloyd this morning, "This is one of the most promising features of recent development at the property, It proves the continuity of the blg ore body.

"We are getting some very fine ore from the winze we are sinking from the 550 level. The winze is now down 25 feet and selected samples have brought as high as 4,000 ounces of silver. The average is high grade and runs 180 ounces in silver, 35 per cent lead and \$8 in gold. The ore is getting much better as we go down. Depth is bringing better results than we expected and there now seems little doubt of what we will get still further down."

Aside from further rumors regarding the health of E. H. Harriman, no news was offered in explanation of the sensational decline. Low prices of the morning effected losses ranging from b to 15 points below the high level of last Monday morning.

The stock mattet opened irregular but with the stocks which showed the greatest weakriss y shearday scoring gains today. Of these New York Central was up 1%, Reaong 1 and Southern Pacific and Union Pacific fractions. On the other hand, American Smelting, Great Northern preferred and Rock Island were forced down a point. Union Pacific opened at 20% but met some large sales and went off to 20%. Later it got back to its opening figure.

There was a violent break in the market soon after the opening under the influence of a bear raid, misgivings as to the health of Mr. Harriman and the manifest lock of support to the recent speculative favorites. Union Pacific dropped to 204, United States Steel to 734, and Southern Pacific to 130%. New York Central and Reading, which had scored early advances of 1% each, broke from 1414 to 137% and 1594 to 1505 respectively. Supporting orders made their appearance when the decline began to look very serious and there was a general raily of between 1 and 2 points. New York Central recovered to 140. Reading got above 15s and Union Pacific got back to 206.

The market showed some feverishness, Reading and Union Pacific fluctuating in the neighborhood of a point. Considerable stock changed hands in the early break, the sales for the first hour running above a half million shares. Local stocks were marked up yigorously, United States Rubber advancing 2 above last night, Third Avenue 3½, Consolidated Gas 1½ and Interborough-Metropolitan preferred 1. At noon the market was on the down grade again, Reading, Union Pacific and United States Steel being under decided pressure.

That stock broke again at 203½, which was 3½ below where it left off yesterday. Sympathetic selling was in large volume in all quarters of the list and one transaction of note was the sale of 8,000 shares of Southern Rallway at 30. Indications of support and some demand from the short interest caused a brisk rally afterwards which carried many stocks up from 2 to 2½ above their low prices of the day. Union Pacific recovered to 205%. New York Central ruled about a point above yesterday's closing. St. Paul and Reading on a parity and a number or other important stocks within a fraction.
