

# Veterans, Attention!

This is for the "boys" of the "Zion's Camp" and the "Mormon Battalion." Surviving members of those famous organizations that played such a prominent part in the events of the early history of the Church, are cordially invited to attend a reunion to be given in their honor by the First Presidency at the Lion House on Tuesday afternoon, April 2. This will be one of the great events of the April conference.

The First Presidency have for some time felt that such a reunion would be a proper acknowledgement of the importance of the services rendered by those who in the early days, cheerfully responded when the call was made upon them. The veterans are rapidly being removed from this sphere of action. There are very few survivors of "Zion's Camp," and, possibly, not more than fifty members of the "Mormon Battalion." They are scattered over a wide area of the country. Some live in Utah, some in California, some in Arizona. Some, probably, have settled in Canada. It would be well if as many as possible could be brought together at the coming reunion.

We hope this invitation will reach all for whom it is intended. Friends of the veterans could call their attention to it, in case they do not happen to see it themselves, and we suggest that those who live far away and may not be able to undertake the journey without financial or other assistance, should receive such from their friends, in order that the reunion may be complete and an event never to be forgotten by those in whose honor it is given.

We also suggest that Stake Presidents and Bishops look after this matter and see to it that none is absent for want of means to undertake the journey.

The invitation is also cordially extended to the wives and widows of the members of the two organizations.

We hope to see a general rally of the veterans. To many of them it will be the last before the great reunion on the other side.

**HOTEL GOSSIP.**

Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Lopus of Grand Junction, Colo., are in the city stopping at the Wilson. Mrs. Lopus came in last evening with her daughter, who was on her way to Goldfield. Mr. Lopus was already in the city, with his son, and the family joined at the hotel. "Grand Junction is the center of a great fruit raising country," said Mr. Lopus today. "Some of the lands with bearing fruit trees bring as high as \$2,000 per acre, which seems a big price, but the value of the crop more than justifies it. I saw land sold for \$300 per acre. The whole country between Grand Junction and Palsade, a distance of 15 miles, is one solid orchard. A peculiar feature connected with fruit growing in that locality is the scheme they have for fighting frost from the buds. Every year the frost comes rather late in the spring, and the trees and their sprouting buds must be protected. Frost warnings are sent out in advance, and the weather man gives the signal, the pump bells are rung and whistles blown and loads of crude oil, of which there is a plentiful supply in that section, are sent around to the residents. The oil is sprinkled on damp straw, etc., and fired, and a cloud of dense smoke is produced from the thousands of fires thus kindled. The smoke hangs like a pall over the surface of the earth, effectually keeping the frost from the fruit trees. No expense is spared by the orchard owners in making smoke in frost time.

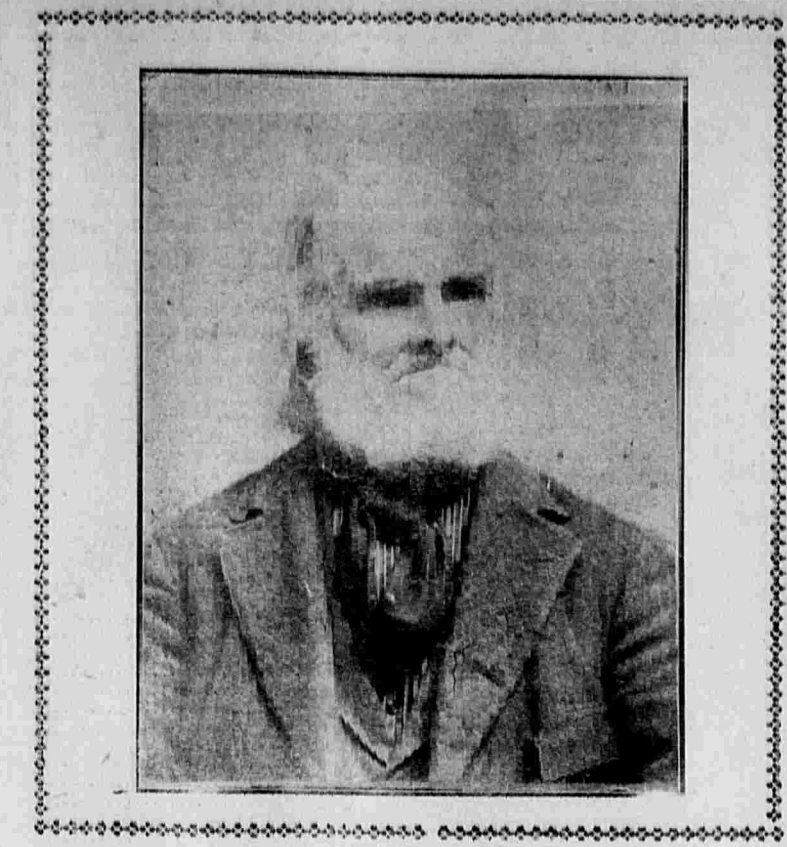

GRANTED TO L. L. NUNN.  
Secretary of Interior Allots Waters of Bear and Mud Lakes.

Washington, March 23.—The secretary of the interior today granted the application of L. L. Nunn to use the water of Bear and Mud lakes, in Utah, for irrigation and power purposes. The matter has been held up for a long time because

Mr. Nunn's plans were believed to interfere with the government project for the utilization of the waters in Bear lake in its own land reclamation projects. In the decision reached today the government agrees to go out of the way to proceed with its own work if Mr. Nunn should fail to keep his engagements. Bear lake is claimed to be the largest natural reservoir suitable for irrigation purposes in the world.

## CONFERENCE OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS
