Much, too, could be gained from the testimonies of high witnesses of miraculous events, and such testimonies were not lacking. All could gain a knowledge of the truth the great work through these various means, and possessed of such a knowledge, they could well afford to meet and overcome difficulties. Under such circumstances a perfect union of the people in the bonds of the faith would not be only possible but natural, proper control and discipline of family circle were explained al.
