UTAH REPUBLICANS RECOGNIZED.

The dispatches from Washington this morning bring word that the meeting of the National Republican Committee on Monday, "a compact between McRae and Hatch for the Utah representation was decided in favor of McRae." A special to the Ogden Standard puts the matter in a different light. It is as follows:

"McRae was seated in Utah. Hatch had withdrawn, and Tatlock, Lincoln, made a tight against McRae, who was not represented. The liberal Republicans left the Republicans of Utah. McRae's article and his action are a complete victory for the National Republicans of Utah."

It looks as though the straight Republican organization of this Territory had received the recognition of the national party. It will be remembered that Arthur Brown, the well known Salt Lake attorney, received the proxy of Judge J. H. McRae, who was the Utah member of the national committee. Judge Hatch was sent to Washington to attend the meeting of the regular Republicans who met in this city. The "liberal" who had invited McRae to represent their faction, taking alarm called a meeting of the so-called Republicans Committee, at which only a minority was actually present. Arthur Brown held the proxy of Arthur Brown, but was rebuked and his principal rejected as a member. Judge McRae's place in the committee was also declared vacant. E. W. Tatlock was chosen to fill the place of Arthur Brown, and C. A. Varyan the place of J. H. McRae. Arthur Pratt, representing Arthur Brown, succeeded, however, in filling the unoccupied position.

The Republican party of Utah, having been recently organized by a Territorial Convention, called for that purpose, and said organization being in full working order, and this committee having refused to work with the Republicans party, has now become an independent party, and every Republican who has given his adherence to the Republicans party, irrespective of all other parties, this committee while posing as Republican has seen fit to give its first allegiance to the so-called "Liberal" party of Utah, and has worked in its interest to the detriment of the Republican party. Therefore, as a Republican, having in view the best interest of the party, I protest against any association of the Republicans with the so-called "Liberal" party, and against any action taken in this regard, or any action being taken in our party which would tend to advance the interests of the "Liberal" party to the detriment of the regular Republican party of Utah. The only duty which this committee can legitimately perform is to adjourn sine die.

A committee of three was chosen to formulate resolutions and a memorial to the National Republican Committee, protesting against what the meeting termed a "Mormon Republican party in Utah." Mr. Tatlock was selected as a representative to the National Committee and is present the moment.

After this it appears, Judge McRae concluded that he would go to Washington himself, and it seems he received recognition, not as the representative of the "Liberal" element here but of the regularly organized Republicans of Utah.

Arthur Brown had on his arrival in New York met with the National League of Republicans Club, where he was invited to make a speech, and at which the Utah Republican League was fully recognized with Hoyt Sherman as executive member. These two events seem to establish the status of the straight Republican organization in this Territory.

This quite proper and consistent. The so-called "Liberal" organization, though composed largely of professing Republicans, is neither Republican nor Democratic in principles, aims or methods. It is not national in any sense, nor is it in accord with the spirit of popular government. It is at most a local faction, out of harmony with all that is truly American. Its representatives, resolutions, memorials and all appear to have failed, and "Liberalism" has received a big setback.

The idea of calling the regular Republican organization a "Mormon Republican party" is extremely absurd but illustrates of Utah "Liberalism." With such Republicans as Judge Zane, C. W. Bennett, Arthur Brown, Arthur Pratt, Marion Parson, Judge Hatch, E. W. Tatlock, E. H. Stoen and many others all professed anti-Mormon" as active members of the party, the "Liberal" attempt to give it such a little bit of weight of the name of that nation.

Tatlock will have his journey for his part, and the "Liberal" organization will be "down in the mouth." But it was not a steady trick to entice him for the "Liberal" whiffle and pretensions which were made out at the last meeting, testing the federal law to come. "Liberalism" is far in the last legs and the action of the National Republican Committee is a warning to all Republicans yet within its ranks of its fast approaching fate.

IN QUESTIONABLE TASTE.

We have received a large number of eastern exchanges containing a two-column article entitled "The Safety of Deseret," and purporting to describe "the practice of all Mormon girls." The article is well written, with but one paragraph perhaps that is positively objectionable, and we attempt to make to unduly distress the ladies who are the subjects of the description and to lessen their claims to purity.

But the alleged practice of these attractive ladies are strategy at discord with the descriptive writer. They are not described as being accustomed to the original, but some of them are positively farcical in appearance. One of them there is scarcely any resemblance to the living realities, and in the cases where they are badly printed they are positively hideous.

What the feelings of these ladies must be, holding their supposed portraits with their names accompanying, we can easily imagine but would like to put into words. While we question the good taste of these personalities and singling out these undeniably honesties as "the practice of all Mormon girls," and consider the statement open to debate, we have no hesitation in condemning the hideous infatuations upon which are printed as their portraits.

The article is a syndicate production, that is, it is written for a company that supplies it ready for printing, cuts and all, as a number of papers in different parts of the country, and therefore it receives a wide circulation. It will not serve to satisfy any great reputation for the beauty of "Mormon" ladies, if these bodies are taken for the prettiest young girls, and we do not think any of them, even if possessed of no more than ordinary grace, will be greatly pleased at having their names bandied about in association with faces so unlike their own.

And seeing that there are so many more of our masculine beauties who receive no mention, and who are just as lovely as those who are described, it is not very likely that the author of the article will increase his popularity among the fair sex of Utah. That the whole business is in bad form.

THE SAINTS IN CHRISTIANITY.

The following appears in the Nynorsk Arbeiderblad, of Oslo, Oct. 21, one of the small widely circulated news papers in Norway:

"The Luddite Saints (Mormons) concluded their conference last Monday with a very successful Church fair, with a total value over \$7,000.

The two previous days had been occupied with several meetings, both in the morning and afternoon.

The conference hall was completely decorated with wreaths, garlands and flowers, and number of flowers round the rostrum, and it was all the time crowded with listeners—the gentlemen on one side of the hall, and the ladies on the other.

Twelve Prelates were present,

among whom were one from Denmark and one from Sweden. These outlined briefly their doctrines, which are founded on the Bible and on the Book of Mormon and Doctrine and Covenants. These books they consider inspired similarly as the Bible.

As Moses on the mount received the commandments of God, so the founder of Mormonism, Joseph Smith, by divine revelation had found his religious system engraved on two gold plates buried in the ground. [This is evidently a misinterpretation of the part of the report.] On the 6th day of April, 1830, he founded the Church with six members, and now there are more than 300,000 followers, scattered in the various countries. This remarkable success gave them proof that the Church was blessed by God. The saints expected the speedy advent of Christ. They believe in divine revelations also in this age. If we understand them (the speakers) correctly, they hold that they had received divine authority to carry on their work."

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
