AMERICAN.

COHUES, N. Y., 15.—The policemen surprised five burglars at work on a safe this morning in the New York Central depot. After an exchange of shots two of the burglars were arrested, one being mortally wounded.

CHICAGO, 15.—The Times Washington special says: Two democrats, Schell, a doorkeeper of the House, and a Confederate Colonel, John W. Fairfax, had an encounter this evening with knives, Fairfax being seriously cut. Schell had ordered Fairfax off the floor of the House. The fight was very fierce for a minute or two. Fairfax was knocked down and stabbed in the neck and near the heart, and is pronounced to be in a precarious condition. Schell is cut but slightly. Both are democrats. Fairfax was Longstreet's chief of staff. He was somewhat intoxicated.

BEARDSTOWN, Ky., 15.—Ten masked men liberated five murderers from jail here this morning.

BOSTON, 16.—The wool market is steady and firm; trade quiet. Sales of Ohio and Pennsylvania, 26,000 lbs. Choice Pennsylvania XX and above 50; X and XX Ohio 47 @ 48; the market is firm at these figures. In Michigan and Wisconsin very little has been done, sales ranging from 39 @ 41. Combing and delaine are still sought after; market firm, sales 137,000 lbs. Choice medium combing at 55, low grades 44 @ 46; pulled quiet, sales 77,600 lbs. of good and choice supers and X at 40 @ 46. In California but very little has been done; prices are unchanged. Choice lots of fall command full prices, but low grades are more difficult to place at satisfactory prices. Sales 214,000 lbs.

WASHINGTON, 16.—Four hundred employees of the bureau of engraving and printing were discharged, to-day, nearly half the force; about two-thirds of them were women.

St. Louis, 16.—The International and Great Northern Railroad is completed. The first through train arrived Austin, Tex., to-day. This secures an air line and shortens the distance between St. Louis and Austin 180 miles.
