COHOES, N. Y., 15 .- The policemen surprised five burglars at work on a safe this morning in the New York Central depot. After an exchange of shots two of the burglars were arrested, one being mortally wounded.

CHICAGO, 15 .- The Times Washington special says: Two democrats, Schell, a doorkeeper of the House, and a Confederate Colonel, John W. Fairfax, had an encounter this evening with knives, Fairfax being seriously cut. Schell had crdered Fairfax off the floor of the House. The fight was very fierce for a minute or two. Fairfax was krocked down and stabbed in the neck and near the heart, and is pronounced to be in a precarious condition. Schell is cut but slightly. Both are democrats. Fairfax was Longstreet's chief of staff. He was somewhat intoxicated.

BEARDSTOWN, EKy., 15. - Ten masked men liberated five murderers from jail here this morning.

This secures an air line and shortens the Chester FR distance between St. Louis and Austin 180 miles.
