## MAJORITY REPORT IS ADOPTED.

### Council Decides Not to Censure Watermaster Seddon.

### VERY LENGTHY DISCUSSION.

#### Action on the Culmer-Jennings Paying Contractor Postponed Indefinitely—Other Matters.

Members of the City Council met in adjourned session last night and considered matters that had gone up before the Council on Tuesday night's meeting. The session lasted three hours and a half and the adjourned session was not closed. The two reports of the water works committee on Commissioner Robertson's resolution concerning Watermaster Seddon for alleged neglect of duty was the cause of much debate, and the Culmer-Jennings paying contractor also brought out much discussion. The Salt Palace site question went over for one week, as also did the matter of supervising the work of improving the city's water system.

**WARD DISCUSSION.** When the majority report of the water works committee on the Parker's paying contractor was presented, the committee reported that with the prospect of a plentiful water supply for the season more new laws were being put in the books of severity and for which abatements were made were being proposed. Many new buildings have been erected in the city, and the water works committee recommended that a new house in some cases in absolute necessity be granted a permit to build, and that the same may be granted. The report of the water works committee on the water works committee was adopted.

The committee on streets recommended that City Engineer P. C. Keay be appointed as the city's representative to superintend the division of the contract for the exchange of water from the Salt Lake and Jordan canals.
