

# NEWSPAPER MEN MAKE MERRY

Maj. Hemphill Pokes Fun at Speaker Cannon and Says He Never Was Right in His Life.

## CHOATE'S HIT AT ROOSEVELT.

Takes Associated Press to Task for Not Having a Correspondent in The Wilds of Africa.

New York, April 22.—Six hundred editors and publishers from all parts of the country tonight attended the joint dinner of the Associated Press and the American Newspaper Publishers' association at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, and Joseph H. Choate were guests of honor and delivered speeches appreciative of the work of the press. Other speakers were Maj. John C. Hemphill of the Charleston News and Courier, Rev. Robert Burdett of Los Angeles and former Senator T. M. Patterson of Colorado.

After the dinner Frank B. Noyes, president of the Associated Press, presented Maj. Hemphill as toastmaster. A toast was drunk to the president of the United States.

Maj. Hemphill spoke of the organization whose members joined in the festive board as "the greatest and most powerful newspaper associations in the world. Here are the publishers who make the money and the editors who spend it, mingling upon the same friendly terms, while the common people pass on the outside, utterly oblivious of our real importance in the great American economy."

In explaining the absence of Speaker Cannon, Maj. Hemphill said the speaker could not be present on account of pressure of business.

"It will do no harm, however," said the toastmaster, "to say behind his back what would have been said to his face, that he made a bad start. He was born in North Carolina, the home of the Mecklenburg myth, which President Taft is to celebrate next month. I am sure to say, but as it was not sufficient handicap, he endeavored before he had reached the stage of discretion, which, by the way, he has not yet attained."

Mr. Choate evoked applause by taking the manager of the Associated Press to task for neglecting to have a correspondent in the wilds of Africa to inform an anxious world of the results of the first hunter, when the great lion quill before him. Adopting a more serious tone, he reviewed the chances that he himself had witnessed in the hands of gathering and transmitting news, and paid a glowing tribute to the Associated Press.

"Today," said he, "the very school boy, before he goes to school in the morning, has taken a voyage all around the world, and knows what has been going on in the last 24 hours in all the countries. That is what the Associated Press has done and is doing every day in enlightening and educating the American people. It has been one of the great factors of education, of civilization and of peace, and what is more, it has brought the corners of the globe together. It has created an international sympathy in which we stand closely and warmly related to all the nations of the earth."

New York, April 22.—Mrs. Catherine Callaux rushed hysterically to St. Vincent's hospital last night seeking medical aid for her 14-month-old son, whom she carried in her arms. When physicians took the child from her they found that it was dead, having expired in her arms. The mother said that the baby boy had eaten a piece of chocolate candy given to him by a friend of the family whose name she withheld. The little body was held and an autopsy will be performed.

## WORKING FOR STATEHOOD FOR NEW MEXICO

Washington, April 22.—Those who endeavored to obtain statehood for New Mexico and Arizona during the last session of Congress, and whose efforts failed to prove successful in the senate, are not relaxing their efforts preparatory to presenting the subject to the regular session of Congress next fall. Representative Hamilton of Michigan, who probably will be chairman of territories, is having the interior department conduct investigations and gather data which will aid in perfecting the land grant clauses of the statehood bill, which passed the house at the last session.

Mr. Hamilton desires to overcome the objections that were made to the features and will reintroduce his bill at the opening of Congress in December with such changes as he believes will meet general approval. The advocates of statehood have received the assurance of President Taft that he will do all in his power to aid in the early passage of a statehood bill.

## CASE OF THE WOODBURY.

Consul General West Inclined to Think She Was Trespassing.

Vancouver, B. C., April 22.—Capt. Sinclair and the crew of the American fishing schooner Charles Levi Woodbury left for Seattle today on the steamer Whatcom. Before leaving, the captain placed sworn statements in the hands of United States Consul General West, bearing on the capture of his vessel by the Dominion cruiser Kestrel.

"I took the statement of Capt. Sinclair and some of his crew yesterday," declared Consul General West, "and I also interviewed the captain of the Kestrel. Close investigation of the charges and comparison of the statements lead me to believe that there is not the slightest doubt that the schooner was in Canadian waters when seen by the Kestrel. But who can I also inclined to believe 'a' that she had drifted inside the limit during fishing operations."

"My opinion is that the Dominion government will recognize the inability of the Woodbury having drifted inside the limit while her skipper and crew were busily engaged in fishing operations, and that the imposition of a fine will meet the case."

## FISH CODE COMPLETED.

Palo Alto, Cal., April 22.—Prof. E. E. Feltner and Dr. David Starr Jordan, respectively English and American commissioners on fisheries, who have been at Stanford university in conference for the past two weeks have at last completed the arduous task of drawing up a code of laws to cover the fisheries within the waters contiguous to the United States and Canada. The work of the commissioners has been done separately for months, each drawing up a statute, and the recent meeting was to combine their findings in one common code. Mr. Prince will submit the statutes

to the Canadian parliament, while Dr. Jordan will present them to President Taft, who will submit them to the senate for ratification. The work, which is considered of vast importance, has been left entirely to the commissioners, who are considered authorities on subjects pertaining to fish and fisheries.

New York, April 22.—Richard Croker, former chief of Tammany Hall, spoke with pride and fond remembrance of his victories in days gone by, during the course of his speech last night at a dinner given in his honor by Norman Black. "None of the many reform campaigns in this city ever succeeded with
