
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BEAVER, Aug. 31, 1880. Editors Deseret News:

I have been asked to explain the nature of soldiers' pay and subsistence and land warrants. Pay and subsistence means the usual wages and pay for rations by the nearest mail route from place of discharge to place of enlistment. Those of the Battalion who have not received it, who went to the Coast are, I believe, entitled to a little over \$100. Those wintering at Pueblo-invalids-not quite so much. A land warrant is a document from the government which entitles the holder to 160 acres of land, and may be laid on any unclaimed land belonging to the United States subject to entry, pre-emption or homestead.
