Although we may sow many good seeds, it will take time for them to germinate, grow and produce fruit; yet by tender care and judicious nourishment a plant now and then blossoms (or takes a firm stand against error) and brings forth bounteous returns for our labor.

Since our arrival 33 persons have emigrated from this State to Colorado, and we have had the privilege of initiating, by baptism, 15 persons into the peaceful covenant of the gospel, three of whom were baptized on the 23d inst. Present indications of doing good still remain favorable and we hope to see some more of the honest in heart partake of the ordinance before long.

Being both young, and having no other elders to converse with, we sometimes feel the want of wise and older heads to govern and instruct us; yet we feel to continue our efforts to spread the truth, for which we ask an interest in the faith and prayers of all interested.

Editors Desert News:

I have been asked to explain the nature of soldiers' pay and subsistence and land warrants. Pay and subsistence means the usual wages and pay for rations by the nearest mail route from place of discharge to place of enlistment. Those of the Battalion who have not received it, who went to the Coast are, I believe, entitled to a little over \$100. Those wintering at Pueblo—invalids—not quite so much. Much of this was drawn by Blair and Babbit in 1852. T. S. Williams, Livingstone and others also drew some.

A land warrant is a document from the government which entitles the holder to 160 acres of land, and may be laid on any unclaimed land belonging to the United States subject to entry, pre-emption or homestead.

The three months extra pay is pretty well understood. All members of the Battalion who have not drawn the above are entitled to them. Also the widows or other heirs of those who have died are entitled to all that was due the soldier at his death. I am asked if Attorney So-and-So, of Kansas, Iowa, or Washington or perhaps Maine is reliable. My answer is, I don't know, but advise the "boys" to patronize their friends, who with them have borne the burden in the heat of the desert.

Editors Desert News:

Just a word from Kanab. I often wonder why more people who want good land for farming and fruit growing purposes do not come out here and enjoy the many blessings which this beautiful climate affords. But perhaps it may be said, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" I will answer, Yes, there can. After being absent on my mission to England a couple of years, I can readily see the growth and improvement among the people and in the country generally, and having visited most of the settlements of this Territory south of Salt Lake City, I will say I find none that excel this for good Latter-day Saints to make a comfortable living, enjoying themselves in a social capacity and giving their children an education.

Not one-half of the good land we now have under fence is cultivated, and the streams of water have increased, so that at times a great amount runs to waste for the want of more help in making ditches, etc. We have had more rain this season than any previous since the settlement of this location. During the past four weeks some heavy showers have fallen, with a little hail, but nothing to do any serious damage, and light showers have been of almost daily occurrence, so that we have been obliged to turn our lucerne in making hay several times; the land is now in good condition for fall plowing and planting, and I may say more grain has been raised during the past season than any previous. The health of the people is very good, and a disposition manifested to unite our energies in home manufactory for self-sustaining. Since the first of last June, co-operation having been revived, a co-op stock company has been formed and incorporated, also a company for

mercantile and manufacturing purposes, so that all the business of this town is done through the people's store. Our tannery is being revived, as we have abundant resources for hides and bark at a reasonable cost, but we want a skilled tanner and currier, to whom, good wages would be paid and means used to assist him here if needed if any one should desire to come and make a home with us. This is a fine location for the production of honey, some few of the brethren having gone into this business, some hundreds of good healthy hives (and no foul brood) are now in the settlement, which produce a great amount of the sweet needed and used by the people. Our apples, peaches and plums are of very fine quality (and no codling moth), grapes are rather light, owing to the severity of last Winter. Respectfully,
