WILL INVADE THE NORTHWEST

Rumored That Western Pacific Will Come to Ogden and Extend to Portland

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 4 .- An important move in railroad advancement in Ogden was made vesterday afternoon which discloses the purpose in the buy. ing up recently of a tract of land sunning through the blocks from Twentyfirst to Twenty-fourth street between Wall and Lincoln avenues. The Rio Grande Western, which is the Gould line running into Ogden, through its attorney, E. M. Allison, Jr., filed sul in the district court against Robert B. Lewis and his wife Lelia W. Lewis. asking for the condemnation of a small strip of land owned by the defendants containing 15-100 of an acre of hnd, situated in the center of the block be-tween Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets and between Wall and Lincoin avenues, and asks that the court place a value on the land. The complaint sets a value on the land. The complaint sets forth that the Rio Grande Western is desirous of erecting a large new freight depat in Ogden, on Twenty-fourth street, and for that purpose has been buying a tract of land running be-iween the blocks mentioned, that they have acquired the entire right of way for the changing of their line and depot from its present location on Waghing-top avenue, between Twentieth and Twenty-fourth street with the excep-tion of the little plece of land belonging

The proposed site on Twenty-fourth street between Wall and Lincoln avenues is one of the best locations that could possibly be found for a freight depot. Recently the Harriman people notified all the wholesalers and coal dealers having wehouses situated on their property Wall avenue to remove their buildngs as quickly as possible, to vacate he site of their proposed new freight epot and a majority of the wholesal of the street and several site side alte side of the sureet and several large warchouses have been and are being crected now.
