JUVENILE COURT
AGAIN UNDER FIRE

Supt. Allison of Industrial School
To Answer for Detention of
Harry Benson.

HORROCKS ESTATE SETTLEMENT

Substantial Reduction in Electric
Light Bills—John V. Bluth Re-

Ogden, Utah, June 29.—The constitutionality of the law creating the juvenile court is to be tested in Weber county. Last evening Atty. Arthur E. Christensen of Salt Lake City filed in the second district court an application for a writ of habeas corpus in behalf of Harry Benson, a minor. The application requested that Judge Howard issue an order compelling Supt. E. M. Allison of the State Industrial school to appear in court with Harry Benson, and to show cause why said Harry Benson should not be released from confinement at the State Industrial school, to which institution he was committed June 18, 1935, by Judge Brown of the juvenile court, Salt Lake City. The court issued an order for Supt. Allison to appear in court July 12, at 10 o'clock, with the young man.

The application sets forth that March 28, 1935, Harry Benson was arrested in Salt Lake City by Probation Officer M. W. Woods, and was taken before Judge Brown of Salt Lake, on the charge of forcibly taking from P. O. Hayward \$15 in money. He was found guilty of the charge and was ordered confined to the State Industrial school on the 18th of June. The applicant alleges that the law creating the juvenile court is unconstitutional, that not sufficient cause was shown at the hearing to find the young man, who is 17 years of age, guilty of the charge, and further that he was not committed under a legal or valid order of judgment of the juvenile court.

Several have been committed to the industrial school from this county by Judge Patton of the juvenile court, and the testing of the legality and constitutionality of the court and these commitments will be awaited with considerable interest.

ESTATE SETTLEMENT.

Property of J. E. Horrocks Will Vest in
Daughter Under Age.

At the session of the district court yesterday afternoon before Judge Horrocks, the contest case of the James E. Horrocks will was again called for settlement, and an agreement having been reached by the parties, the suit, the compromise was approved by the court and the case dismissed.

The plaintiff in the action, James Horrocks, and guardian of Beatrice L. Horrocks, daughter of the deceased, also her mother and grandmother, were agreeable to the settlement, which provides that Mrs. Ann Horrocks-Martin shall have all the property bequeathed to her by her son, James E. Horrocks, in trust for Beatrice L. Horrocks, the daughter of the deceased, until she reaches the age of 21 years, at which time the property shall be divided equally between her and her mother, Mrs. Ann Horrocks-Martin.
