CONGRESSIONAL

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 27.—Eaton, from

the committee on appropriations, re-

ported an amended naval bill placed

on the calendar.

Morgan, by request, introduced a

bill directing the Court of Claims

to investigate the Benjamin Well

& Tabor Mining Company's

referral.

A joint resolution authorizing the

President to reappoint Stephen A.

McCarthy, lieutenant in the navy,

passed.

The Indian appropriation bill was

taken up.

Teller introduced the idea of keep-

ing an agent among the Moquis

Pueblos who had been peaceful and

civilized 50 years. The agent was

an unmitigated nuisance, in that

he was sending the Indians to the

reservation, and he was

in fact, they have not advanced a

Daves said the condition of the

Indians was getting worse every day.

Beck said everything possible was

being done to keep them and pre-

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 27.—A resolution

was adopted asking the President

for all the correspondence respect-

ing the alleged interference with

American fishermen in Fortunally;

adopted.

May 15th is set apart for the con-

sideration of Chinese immigration

and reports from the Education and

Labor Commission, and the bill to

enforce the eight-hour law.

Eyre, from the committee on ways

and means, reported a bill regulat-

ing the importation of raw material

to be manufactured in the United

States, or built for foreign

account, referred to the committee

of the whole.

Ballou introduced a joint resolu-

tion appointing a commission of

seven to inquire into the alleged in-

terference in oratory may be intro-

Towne introduced a bill protect-

ing senders and receivers of telegraphic

A bill authorizing the registration

of lands was taken up.

McDonald reported it as it was unop-

posed. The previous question

was ordered. Search warrant and

penal sections were taken up and

the bill passed.

CAPITAL CHAT.

WASHINGTON, 27.—The Senate

to-day passed Booth's bill amend-

ing the act of 1859, which

provides for agricultural lands to

be sold to the United States

bonds bearing any rate of interest,

and also to allow their investment

in such other manner as the laws

of the respective States may provide.

The existing law prohibits their in-

vestment in United States bonds

yielding a smaller net return than

five per cent.

Hon. John F. Swift, chairman

of the Finance Committee, said

that the bill was introduced

and passed by the Senate

and House to-day, and was ex-

pectively introduced by members

of the California delegation to pro-

mot republicans and senators of both

parties who sympathized with the

people of the Pacific Coast in re-

spect to the evils of Chinese im-

migration and earnestly desire a modifi-

cation of the Burlingame treaty to re-

strict it.

The consular and diplomatic ap-

propriation bill, with the Senate

amendment providing for the salary

and expenses of the treaty commis-

sioners, and the bill to amend the

act of 1859, which provides for

the sale of agricultural lands to

the United States, were taken up

and passed by the Senate to-day.

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
