Brazil's President Cordially Welcomes Officers of Visiting American Battleships.

# **RECEPTION AT U. S. EMBASSY.**

Some Sailors Ashore Engaged in an **Unseemly Brawl With Portuguese** And Brazilian Boatmen.

Rio Janeiro, Jan. 14 .- The first of the many official functions to be given in honor of the visiting American naval officers during their stay, took place yesterday. The first event was a visit to the Brazilian minister of marine, Admiral Alencar, and this was followed by a reception by the president of the republic, Dr. Penna, and a banquet by the American ambassador, Irving B. Dudley.

ving B. Dudley. Dr. Penna cordially welcomed the vis-itors to Brazil. The ambassador's functions was a brilliant affair. In the afternoon the office'rs went out to Petropolis, the home of the dip-lomatic corps, 22 miles distant from the capital. They were accompanied by many high Brazilian officers, and by representatives of the various legations. At the railroad station of this suburb they were received by the private secre-tary of Mr. Dudley, and joined shortly afterward by the ambassador himself.

WELCOMED BY PENNA.

WELCOMED BY PENNA. The party then proceeded to the resi-dence of the president. Mr. Dudley presented Admiral Thomas to the pres-ident, and then introduced each officer in turn. Replying to an address made by Admiral Thomas, Dr. Penna said: "I am extremely gratified at the presence here of the officers command-ing the powerful fleet sent to these waters by the friendly nation of the north, a nation to which we are united by bonds of strong friendship. I con-gratulate you upon your ability as navigators, and express my admira-tion. You have arrived punctually at your destination, in spite of the great difficulties presented by your under-taking.

Upon leaving the residence of Dr. Penna, the officers were driven to the home of Mr. Dudley. The banquet was superb. The entire house and grounds were illuminated by Venetian lamps and colored electric lights. Within the salons were ablaze with graceful il-lumination and colored flowers. The tables were laid in two of the salons, and were unlited by an arc of flowers. They were decorated with cut glass, beautiful silverware and more flowers. Among those present were all the ad-mirals, the commanding officers of each battleship, the Brazilian minister of marine, the Brazilian minister of war, the chief of the naval staff, an official representing the minister of official representing the minister of foreign affairs, Baron Derio Branco, and a number of deputies and senators.

#### SAILORS HAVE BRAWL.

The matter was not serious. The granting of shore leave was resumed today, when 4,000 men, double the number of yesterday, were permitted to go ashore. The lo-cal authorities consented to this large shore party. The men have been cor-dially received in Rio Janeiro."

They had been sweethearts for six years, she said, and she killed Shirey because he had discarded her. Shirey was a widower, 45 years old, and was a native of Dover Hill, Ind. San Francisco, Jan. 14 .- After a cond conference between Dist.-Atty. Langdon and Detective Burns and Abraham Ruef held late this afternoon, Mr. Langdon would only say

that the time is not ripe for a pubne statement regarding the matter of whether Ruef is to be granted absolute immunity from prosecution, in return for telling all he knows about the bribery charges on the witness stand. Ruef also refused to say whether the contract granting him immunity had been signed or not. Judge Dunne has said that he will not agree to any such proposition, and it is believed that his attitude furnishes the rea-son for the science of the others at this time.

The negotiations between the dis-trict-attorney's office and Abraham Ruef for the past few days with the object in view of securing his testimony in the bribery-graft cases in return for immunity, whole or partial, for the former po-litical boss, encountered an obstaca-today which threatens the entire plans of the prosecution, when Superior today which threatens the entire plans of the prosecution, when Superior Judge Dunne flatly refused to be a party to any such arrangement, and so informed Dist.-Atty. Langdon. Incidentally it also developed today that the district attorney's unexplained silence last night, after he had prom-ised at the conclusion of a conference in the afternoon between himself, Spe-cial Agent William J. Burns and Ruef, to take the public into his confidence regarding the plans of the prosecution, was in part due to certain demands made by Ruef which met with a rebut at the hands of Judge Dunne this

morning. Speaking to the Associated Press this morning, after DistAtty, Lang-don had been in conference with him, Judge Dunne said: "It is absurd to talk to me about an

immunity contract for any person charged with crime, whether it be John Smith, William Jones or Abra-ham Ruef. I have not been asked to sign such a contract for Ruef, as the district-attorney knows that it would be useless to broach such a subject to be useless to broach such a subject to

me. "The district-attorney today made certain suggestions to me in regard to some motions which it seems Ruef wants my acquiescence to. I stated to Mr. Langdon that I will listen to the suggestions of any district-attorneys, made in open court; if I believe him to be honest, well advised and well in-formed in the matter, and his sugges-tion is in the interest of justice, I will act upon it. But I will entertain no-motions in my chambers nor commit myself in advance to any step or ar-rangement having for its object the immunity, wholly or partial, of any person charged with crime, whether it be Ruef or any one else." Following the continuance until next Monday, at the request of the prose-cution, of the bribery caser against Patrick Calhoun and other officials of the United Railroads, which came up before Judge Lawior this morning, Langdon, Burns and Ruef met in the corridors of the Temple Israel, drew aside and engaged in an animated con-versation.
