DAY'S ATTORNEYS ARE WORKING HARD

Strenuous Efforts Being Put Forth to Save Life of Condemned Man.

CLAIM NEW EVIDENCE FOUND

May Ask Supreme Court for Rehearing of Case, or Seek Reprieve From Governor Cutler.

The attorneys of A. T. Day, sentenced to be shot on Friday next at the state prison, are making strenuous efforts to save the negro's life. It is possible that some time today a petition to the board of pardons will be filed asking further consideration of his case, seeking commutation of sentence to life imprisonment. The attorneys may file with the supreme court information to the effect that they have discovered new and material evidence which should go before the court and seek a rehearing of the case upon this ground. One other course remains: To seek a reprieve from Gov. John C. Cutler.

WORKING HARD. Associated with Little and Dunn, attorneys for Day at the time he was tried in the district court on the charge of murder, are Dickson, Ellis, Ellis & Schuller. These attorneys have combined to take every step within the law to forestall the execution of their client. Their action was heralded for this morning, but up to noon nothing had been filed with the state's officers. It is probable that they will take some action in the matter before the day is over.

DIED OF TUBERCULOSIS. Physicians Announce Result of Autopsy Over John Sergestrand.

John Sergestrand's sudden death was caused by tuberculosis. Such is the verdict returned by Drs. Calderwood and Riley after an autopsy performed in yesterday afternoon. This disease is believed to have brought about delirium, which the doctors imagined Friday to have been the result of unnatural causes, such as the presence of drugs. Sergestrand was arrested by the police Thursday and taken before the insanity board meeting the same day in the city and county building. His actions, while those of an insane man were no queer as to excite suspicion and belief that some kind of drug was the cause of his insanity. The body is now at Joseph William Taylor's awaiting burial. No word has been received from friends and unless relatives or acquaintances of the dead man step forward to contribute toward the burial, this will have to be paid for by the county.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS. Civil service examinations will be held in this city, Dec. 27, for clerk and teacher in the Philippine service. It is desired to secure as a result of this examination as many eligibles as possible who are college graduates, including graduates of polytechnic and agricultural schools, and eligibles who are normal school graduates. There are at least 30 vacancies in the position of clerk to be filled, and appointments to that position as a result of this examination, except in special cases, will be made at \$1.50 per annum. While some appointments may be made at \$1.00 or \$1.20, the majority of those selected will be appointed at \$1.50. Those appointed will be eligible for promotion from \$1.00 to \$2.00 for division superintendent. Eligibility in the assistant examination is required for promotion to division superintendent.
