

WOULD REGULATE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Petitions Circulated in Los Angeles Asking for Monopoly of the Saloon Business.

BY BENEVOLENT CORPORATION.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 14.—Initiative petitions will be placed in circulation within the next 10 days asking the council to adopt an ordinance granting to a "benevolent corporation" the monopoly of the saloon business in Los Angeles. So say the organizers of the corporation which seeks to regulate the liquor traffic of Los Angeles along the lines that has made Gothenberg famous.

Subscription lists have been in circulation for the last week, and a goodly portion of the half million dollars which will be needed to apply the Gothenberg system has already been subscribed.

Frick Talks of Equitable Affairs.

New York, June 15.—For the first time since he presented his report of the Equitable investigation, Henry C. Frick is quoted as having spoken of the society's affairs. He was interviewed while attending the Princeton commencement exercises.

"When the board of directors of the Equitable failed," he said, "to adopt the report, or any part of it, of the committee they appointed to investigate the present management, of course my connection with the society ended."

New York's New Custom House.

New York, June 15.—Work on the exterior of the new granite custom house at Bowling Green in this city has been practically completed and it is expected

ed that the building will be ready for occupancy within 15 months. The contractors were only two months behind in completing the exterior work. This has cost \$3,000,000 and it is estimated that the interior will require \$1,000,000. In all its appointments, the building is designed to be the finest custom house in the world, both as a structure and as an office for the transaction of customs business. It is 125 feet high, with a frontage of 191 feet on Bowling Green and 278 feet on Broadway and Whitehall streets. The architectural style is that of the renaissance.

Concho County Wool Sold.

San Angelo, Tex., June 15.—The entire eight months spring wool clip of the Concho county, the largest clip of short wool in the state was sold yesterday. The clip amounted to 1,135,000 pounds and was bought by two Boston bidders. Prices are held strictly secret, but are believed to be between 22 and 23 cents a pound.

The 12 months' wool clip, also the largest in the state, amounting to 800,000 or 900,000 pounds, has not been sold yet, but will be disposed of this week. Competition is brisk among the buyers here, every big wool house in the United States is represented. Sheepmen are delighted with the prices, an advance of 6 to 8 cents over last year and the highest price since 1893.
