A County Jail Filled With Robbers
Thieves and Hold-ups—California
Wine Producers Organize.

A few nights since, says the Glenwood Springs Advertiser, three men took one of the section men to hand, with the purpose of robbing him, and forced him to cross the river on the bridge bridge. They told him they would kill him if he did not give up his money. On the other side of the river they tripped him up and "knocked" him, and made not six dollars saved for the day. But two of them have since caught.

Through the carelessness in leaving a valuable revolver lying around the house, a San Francisco woman (it is said) is the victim of an attempted robbery. While making breakfast on Wednesday morning the chief boy, left at 10 A.M., said "Money or your life," and pointed the revolver at his brother and pulled the trigger, which was not fired. The boy was taken to the police station, and his brother in the left arm. The man who did the shooting ran away and has not yet been found.

The wine producers of California, says the San Francisco Chronicle, have joined in an organization for their mutual protection. They have brought about fifteen wine makers of Sonoma and Napa to form a permanent organization. First the attempt was made to entrap grape-growers and wine-makers, but it failed. Then a further resolution was passed to form two large dealers who refused to enter into the combine. Then an attempt was made to get together all the grape-growers and wine-makers, but this also failed, principally because it was discovered that there was a large number of men with partially conflicting interests.

A very remarkable accident, with results that may prove fatal, has occurred at Colfax, Colo. The 12-year-old son of E. J. Hanes, of Yuma, Ariz., went out to shoot, taking with him a small revolver. After some shots were fired, the boy fell, and the gun exploded, causing a terrible laceration of the left eye. Examination by a physician showed that the eye had been destroyed, and it was removed. Before and after the operation the boy has been in a state of stupor and unconsciousness, and there are fears that the brain is affected by the shock.

In the Superior court at Fresno, Calif., on Thursday, a suit for divorce was filed by U. S. Jones against Margaret A. Jones, on the grounds of desertion. Mr. and Mrs. Jones were married in Mississippi thirty-two years ago. The wife had no complaints until after the discovery of gold in California, where they kept the old Western hotel for several years. Mr. Jones has spent the greater part of his time trying to make his fortune, beginning with personal labor, then managing a hotel, and finally opening a saloon, with his partner in business, some of his profits on eat, smokers and gamblers wasted for awhile to promote some returns, but he never seemed able to turn any of his gains into capital. As he grew older his income increased, and his habits and place until it is said that his wife could no longer live with him, and the result was separation, which may have been a ground for a divorce.

When sheep are killed at night, dog traps may be made for sheep pens by stringing furred traps along the fence posts high enough so that a dog cannot jump over.

Sheep farmers in England do not all follow the same methods of care and management of their flocks, says John Jackson of Ontario. To some sections of the country have shown permanent pastures that can be allowed to remain at large for a portion of the year. In other parts of the country, they are held in livelock pens and wintered.

For keeping the flies off a small number of horses or cattle nothing is better than a solution of plough soap. The animals may be washed with it, or flies will not trouble them till it has a chance to evaporate. A large number of animals might be sprinkled with the solution from the nozzle of a hose. The plough soap contains no insecticide.

A writer in The Bostonian recommends that as soon as a baby begins to nibble there should be placed in the mouth's cell—little food box containing a handful of soft bread and cereal cuts, for it to practice on. It learns to quickly.

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
