Correspondence of the News. PAYSON, July 7.—On Wednesday evening last, Father Joseph Hancock peacefully departed this life, at the residence of his daughter, Amy Hancock (wife of George W. Hancock). Father Hancock was in his 83rd year, and for some years past had been very feeble. Having been baptized as a member of the church in 1830, ordained as one of the first "New Year's" group in 1835 under the hands of Joseph Smith, Oliver Cowdery and Sidney Rigdon, and identified with the interests of the church from its earliest days until the present, his life has been a very eventful one.
