LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Water Pipes.—The water pipes are being laid across Main Street to McKinnin's new stables.

Watch Charm Lost.—The finder of a watch charm in the shape of a small locket, will confer a favor by leaving it at this office for the owner.

Theatricals.—The 21st Ward Theatricals intend giving a grand dramatic performance in the Ward meeting-house, on Friday, December 5th.

Lost.—A lady's gold bracelet, this afternoon, between the Council House and the Deseret University. The finder will please leave it at this office.

Pleasant Call.—We had a pleasant call this morning from Mr. T. D. Evans, of Hastings, Nebraska, one of the editors and proprietors of the *Central Nebraska*. He has been here a day or two and will remain several days longer. Pleasant visit.

Hermann.—Wednesday evening the second and last appearance of the renowned "King of Wizardry" was not greeted by a very large audience, but those who were in attendance manifested their appreciation of the Professor's skill in the art of illusion, and the comicalities of the "anatomical wonders," the *Lorelei*, in the most enthusiastic manner. There is no doubt of Hermann's ability to present one of the best exhibitions of the kind now traveling.

Utah Stake Conference.—Saturday and Sunday, the 29th and 30th inst., the Quarterly Conference of Utah Stake will be held at Provo. President John Taylor, Elder Joseph F. Smith, Bishop Robert T. Burton, Elder C. W. Penrose and others will be in attendance. The first three are already on a tour of Utah County, and will be at Provo to-morrow at the time of commencing meeting, while the others will go down here by the morning train. Elder B. Young will leave for Provo Sunday morning.

Home Handwork.—Brother Thomas Slight, foreman of the Deseret News type foundry, besides being an expert in the manufacture of printing material, is also quite an artist in other lines. We have seen a specimen of his Christmas boxes, made by hand. They are nice pieces of work, handsome in pattern and beautiful in finish. Last year, he made quite a number for Z. C. M. I., and is now prepared to receive orders for the holidays. A year ago, he was awarded a bronze medal for his boxes at the Territorial Fair.

"Enquirer" Items.—The grading of the road bed of the U. & P. V. R. R. is being pushed along as rapidly as the weather will permit.

A consignment of steel rails, sufficient to lay the track from Springville to this city, is on the way from the East. About three weeks, the weather permitting, will find the road passable to Provo.

Last Monday, as the northern bound freight train passed out of the Nephi station, the coupling between two cars broke, about in the centre of the train, leaving eight cars behind. The atmosphere being very foggy, they were not missed until the foremost part of the train had gone nearly as far as Mona, a distance of 7 or 8 miles.

On Saturday morning last, between 5 and 6 o'clock, Mr. John Quigley, of Payson, discovered his house on fire, the roof being nearly consumed. It had caught fire from a defective stove-pipe passing through the roof, and the fire had been smoldering during the night without the family knowing it.

The morning being foggy and the house being situated a considerable distance from any other, an alarm could not be given. Mr. Quigley and his wife worked with a will, and saved most of the property in the house.

Resolutions of Respect.—On Wednesday evening, a special meeting of the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society was held in the City Hall, for the purpose of framing sentiments of respect in memory of the late Hon. A. P. Rockwood, one of the Directors and leading spirits of that association. The following preamble and resolution were there adopted:

Whereas, It has pleased Providence to take from the midst of this community our esteemed brother, Albert P. Rockwood, whose demise occurred at 4.35 this morning, at the ripe age of 74 years; therefore,

Be it Resolved, That it is the feeling of this board, that in the death of our brother, we have lost an efficient member of this society, one who has been a director for 20 years and who has worked in a most thorough and indefatigable manner; and his family and relatives, who have our heartfelt sympathies in their bereavement, have lost a most worthy husband, father and patriarch; and that we attend his funeral in a body, and thus express to his family the endearing love that exist between us, and that these resolutions and sentiments be published in the Deseret News and Salt Lake Herald.

Charge Ignored.—The charge preferred against J. H. Feign of breaking into the Ogden Post Office, was ignored by the Grand Jury, and the defendant, who has been in the Penitentiary since his examination before Commissioner Sprague, last summer, has been released from custody. But few believe that Mr. Feign entered the Post Office with any criminal intent.

He had been formerly a clerk in the office there, and was in the habit of going into the office to sleep. The laws are strict, however, in prohibiting persons not employed in post offices from entering the interior unauthorized, and handling mail matter. Mr. Feign has been severely punished for his indiscretion, and will, no doubt, heed the lesson taught him by his penitentiary experience.

The Brigham City Company.—Mr. Phillip Margetts, our local comedian, informs us that on his recent visit to the north, while at Brigham City he played exclusively with the dramatic company of that place, which was ably managed by Mr. H. E. Bowring, our old Salt Lake theatrical friend.

Mr. Margetts speaks in high commendation of the improvement in the histrionic art, the most prominent members of the association being Messrs. Eli Pierce and E. Box.

Mrs. M. Young and Miss Lydia Snow. Mr. Margetts is under engagement to visit Providence soon after New Year's, when he will be supported by the theatrical company of that place.

Obsequies.—The funeral services over the remains of the late President A. P. Rockwood, were held at one o'clock this afternoon, in the Twelfth Ward Assembly Rooms. Besides the family, there was a good attendance of the friends and acquaintances of the honored dead.

The assembly was addressed in turn by Presidents A. M. Cannon and George Teasdale. The remarks were of a comforting and instructive character to the bereaved relatives and the congregation in general.

Funeral.—The obsequies of Elder John Doble were held as announced, in the Tenth Ward Meeting House, Wednesday afternoon. He was a man of integrity and uprightness of character and had many friends. His fellow laborers at the Church Quarry were at the funeral in a body, and eulogistic and consolatory remarks were made by Counselor Joseph E. Taylor, Bishop I. W. Hardy and others.

As the vehicle gained on him, the pursued broke through the fence surrounding the residence of the late Apostle Oson Hyde and disappeared in the orchard at the rear, while the pursuers sped around the corner to intercept him as he emerged into the street on the other side. Captured and Retaken.—A couple of "our nation's defenders," wishing to keep their hands in, made a charge on a horse and buggy, tied near the door of a residence in the Sugar House Ward, last evening, and under the excitement of the exercise they had indulged in, forgetting the vehicle and animal belonged to somebody else, rode away with their prize toward Dudley's Brewery. Still no signs of capitulation. Another shot, this time through the back of the bug-gle seat, caused the boys in blue to reconsider their original intention of fighting it out according to established codes of warfare, and jumping from the buggy, they executed a flank movement over the hill toward the garrison, leaving the horse and vehicle to pursue the uneven tenor of its way, until it was retaken by the owners and led in triumph back to its first position.

He died as he had lived, a faithful follower of Christ, with full hopes in a glorious resurrection. —*Logan Leader.*
