CONGRESSIONAL.  
Bills Passed—Bankrupt Laws,  
A. C.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 26.—The  
House bill, granting authority for  
coinage to be executed at the  
mints of the U. S. for foreign coun-  
tries, was passed; also the House  
bill abolishing the office of first  
deputy commissioner of internal  
revenue.

The judiciary committee reported  
back the bill to amend the bank-  
rupt act, with amendments. The  
additional amendments relate  
mostly to matters of detail involv-  
ing the amendments already re-  
ported, the following, however, are  
new and important: an amend-  
ment providing that in cases of  
voluntary bankruptcy a discharge  
shall be granted when the assets  
shall not be equal to 33  
per centum, instead of fifty per  
cent as now; of the claim proved  
against his estate, upon which he  
shall be liable as the principal  
debtor, without the assent of his  
creditors, in number and value as  
prescribed by the existing law; an  
amendment providing that in com-  
puting the number of creditors who  
shall join in a petition to have the  
debtor adjudged bankrupt the  
creditors whose respective debts do  
not exceed \$250, or if the re-  
quirement of the one-fourth of all credi-  
tors; but if there be no creditors  
whose debts exceed \$250, or if the  
requirement of the one-fourth of all credi-  
tors holding debts exceeding \$250 fall to  
sign the petition, creditors having  
debts of less amount shall be re-  
quired for the purposes aforesaid.

Logan introduced a bill provid-  
ing that a pension of eight dollars  
per month shall be given to each  
honorary, discharged surviving offi-  
cers and enlisted men, including  
militia volunteers of the military  
and of the naval service, who serv-  
ed sixty days in the war of Mexi-  
co, and also to the surviving un-  
married widows of such officers  
and soldiers.

**HOUSE.**  
**Removal of Troops—Supervisor**  
**of Internal Revenue.**  
Mills introduced a bill for the re-  
moval of all troops from the Southern  
States to the western country, as a  
protection against Indians.

A resolution instructing the com-  
mittee of ways and means to in-  
quire whether there is any neces-  
sity for the continuance of the  
office of supervisor of internal re-  
venue was adopted.

**EASTERN.**  
**Suit Commenced.**  
NEW YORK, 26.—A suit has been  
begun against the official bond of  
ex-postmaster Jones of this city, on  
the ground that the late postmas-  
ter is responsible for the alleged de-  
duction of more than a hundred  
thousand dollars by John W. Nor-  
ton, ex-superintendent of the mon-  
ey order department.

**Two Fires.**  
The confectionary manufactory  
of R. S. Gilbert & Co., Washington  
street, was burned this evening;  
loss \$70,000. The pattern shop of  
the Quintard Iron Works was burn-  
ed to-night; loss \$75,000.

**Internal Revenue—Exhibit n**  
**Commission.**  
WASHINGTON, 26.—The indica-  
tions are that the internal revenue  
receipts for the month will foot up  
to nine and a half millions, of  
which it is estimated that one mil-  
lion comes from the semi-annual  
tax on banks, leaving the balance  
of the month's collection about the  
average of the fiscal year previous  
to this date.

The President to-day issued an  
executive order providing for a  
commission of one from each ex-  
ecutive department, one from the  
Smithsonian Institution, and one  
from the department of agriculture,  
to prepare and arrange a collection  
of such articles from each depart-  
ment for exhibition in the Phila-  
delphia Centennial Celebration, as  
will illustrate the functions and  
administrative facilities of the gov-  
ernment in time of peace, and its  
resources in a war.

**Will Report Favorably—Take a**

SAN FRANCISCO, 26.—The steam-  
er *Maurepore* brings Australian

sequent proceedings at Nasova, where  
about one hundred unarmed white  
men were driven back and ill-used  
by twelve hundred Fijians armed

to the teeth, has elicited a general  
feeling in the colonies that Eng-  
land should at once assume the sov-  
ereignty of these islands. It is an-  
nounced by the ministry that one  
of Her Majesty's ministers will pro-  
ceed, under instructions, via Hon-  
olulu, to Washington, and most  
likely on to Europe, for the pur-  
pose of pressing upon the great  
powers the claims of this kingdom  
to the fullest recognition. At Viti  
Levu, an inter-tribal dispute had  
arisen between the natives of  
Nalawa and the Dawaru people,  
resulting in a collision in which  
lives were lost. This is an old  
dispute of years standing.

The health of the king of the  
Sandwich Islands is reported to be  
much improved. The approaching  
elections create much interest. Mr.  
Wideman has tendered his resigna-
