He was a was a lawyer, graduate of an English college, was a literatus, and wrote the English language more fluently than most of his country men were able to handle the Mandarin characters. Besides these accomplishments Mr. Ho was a diplomatist, and his natural adaptability in this regard had been ultivated by the practice entailed in a lengthy residence at the Legation at Washington, Mr. Ho came to San Francisco as vice consul. Six consul-generals had been during the precedng three years sent by Pekin to San Francisco to settle the trouble, and each had been successively recalled, leaving the situation unchanged. The whole of the merchant and general business class was reduced to the last stratts.
