"Don't be too sure of that," replied a quiet gentleman who was standing near by. The sickly smile that came over the F. O. H.'s countenance, told a story of doubt and dread.

The Latest.—The latest developments in the attempt by the local authorities to purify the morals of the city were the usual street rumors, the inevitable question, "What is your number?" and the arrival of C. His trial was set for 10 o'clock, but at his request Judge Speers changed the time to 11; and at that hour the city attorneys were on hand ready to give or receive whatever was proper. DAVID M. STUART ARRESTED—EXCITEMENT OVER THE TURNING OF THE TABLES.

OGDEN CITY, Utah, Nov. 23rd, 1885.

The grand jury of the First Judicial District continue in full session and the court also in full session under the Edmunds law and other statutes. We may, therefore, soon expect a large number of arrests.

Since the arrest of Apostle Snow has fallen into the hands of the minions of law. This evening C. L. Gray and H. E. Steele, went to the residence of BISHOP LAIRD M. STUART.

and arrested him on the common charge of unlawful cohabitation. Bishop Stuart is a quiet, orderly, inoffensive man, and is one of Ogden's oldest citizens. He is well known and much esteemed by those who are best acquainted with him. There was but little excitement over the arrest, as such proceedings are looked upon as "matters of course" and to be expected at any time.

The prisoner was at once taken before Commissioner Black, and by him placed under \$1,500 bonds to appear when required in the presence of his inquisitors. Wm. Driver and Joseph A. West became his sureties.
