We feel grateful to the Legislative Assembly for its liberal appropriations to make Mud Lake passable in all seasons.

The project of bridging the Sevier and getting the "Dixie" travel to pass through here is a good deal talked of. It seems that this route would have many advantages over the old one, principally in being so much shorter and, on the whole, a better road. If these improvements were made and the railroad through, we would feel ourselves in closer proximity to "the rest of mankind."

Our soil is rich, fertile and well adapted to the production of the various cereals, and we have water in abundance. This region has been justly called the granary of the south.

Br. William H. Walker has built a saw mill at Oak Creek and opened a road to the timber, and has now completed an excellent grist mill. It is one of Straud's patent, and is driven by a suction wheel. The work was superintended by Jonathan Smith.

It is said that br. Croft's mill makes as good an article of flour as any in the Territory.

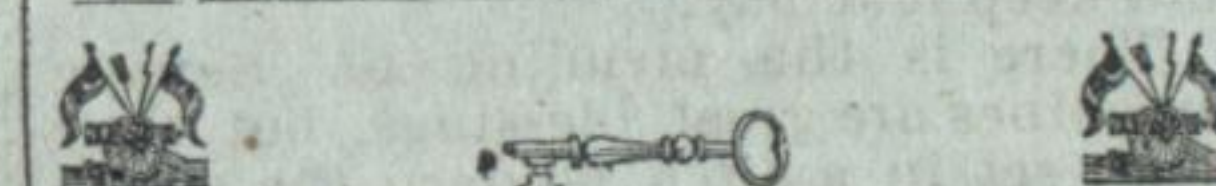
