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LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Stage Rehearsal.—The members of the Home Dramatic Club will meet at the Theatre this evening for rehearsal.

Light Snow.—Over an inch of snow fell during the night, and again the hopes of the weather prophet are dashed to pieces.

Bishops' Meeting.—The Bishops' meeting convenes at 7 o'clock to-night, instead of 6, as heretofore. The lengthening days necessitate the change.

Going Home.—A party of eight or ten Indians were mounted on the tender of the southern bound express train this morning, on the way to the happy hunting grounds of Snipe.

Drunkness and Disturbance.—A man named Layton was brought up from the depot, last evening, in an advanced state of inebriation, and was fined \$10 this morning for his indulgence in the cup of forgetfulness.

Another person. by the name of Kopach, also paid \$10 into the city treasury as a penalty for being drunk and disturbing the peace.

Returned.—Mr. Phillip Margrets, the favorite comedian, returned last evening from Provo, where he has created considerable enthusiasm among the amusement loving people of that place, by his excellent rendition of the character of "A Party by the Name of Johnson," in the "Lancashire Lass," and that of "Froggy" in the "Chimney Corner." He became so popular while there, that he was to extend his engagement one night, when the "Lancashire Lass" was given for the third time.

The Glass Project.—The project of the establishment of a glass manufactory in this city, mentioned several times of late in this paper is about to be realized. Active movements are on foot to place the enterprise on the already commendable list of our home industries. A gentleman well known in this city, but who prefers to remain unknown just at present, is diligently engaged in working up the new enterprise. It will probably be started at first on a moderate scale, as a sort of experiment, and, as the business grows, by degrees. We wish the plan every success, and are anxious to see it upon a permanent basis.

Another Accidental Shooting.—The other day we chronicled a case of accidental shooting from the careless handling of a gun by a young man who was out shooting ducks on Jordan minge. The account of a mishap, almost the counterpart of this is sent over the wires from Minersville. Yesterday, at that place, a thirteen-year old son of William Goodman, while out hunting, shot himself in the thigh. He was in company of a number of other small boys, and was getting through a fence and pulling the gun after him, when the weapon was discharged, with the result stated. It is not time that people learned that it is just as easy and much safer to keep firearms pointed away from their bodies, when necessary does not compel it to be otherwise?

"Enquirer" Notes.—The Provo Factory started up again on Monday for another long run. We learn from an anonymous correspondent that persons interested in Payson in bee farming held a meeting last week and organized for mutual protection against "foul brood."

On Sunday last a bright, interesting four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Elliott, Fourth Ward, died of the effects of diphtheria. With other friends we deeply sympathize with the bereaved parents.

Bishop W. E. Nuttall, of Wallburg, Wasatch County, informs us that, out of about forty cases of diphtheria in that place, there have been ten deaths, the last death occurring on Monday, a week ago, from taking a relapse of the disease. No new cases are reported.

The move is making from the hill-sides, and stock are able to get a little dry feed, which will probably see them through till grass grows.

Another Runaway.—Yesterday, the team that hauls freight for Z. C. M. I. had a runaway down near the depot. The horses, which are very high spirited and have frequently tried to break from control, were hitched to the wagon and the team backed up to a car of grain, which was being emptied. The lines were fastened to the handle of the car door. Taking fright at something, the animals made a lunge forward, but the reins holding good, they were brought up on their heels in an almost upright position. Again they plunged forward and this time the lines broke off short at the cross checks. The team careered away from the spot and started up the street at a rapid rate. The driver, Mr. Henry Love, of the Sixth Ward, was thrown from the wagon in front of the station and somewhat bruised by the fall. The flight of the horses was soon afterwards checked by the street railway workmen, about two blocks east of the depot. Mr. Love is not working to-day, but is not seriously injured.

"Dead in Earnest."—In our item last evening of the 21st Ward dramatic entertainment, it was stated that the farce "Too Much for a Manager" also went off well. We are since informed that the piece did not deserve such a favorable notice, that it became quite tedious to the audience, who would also have "gone off well" if there had been room to get out of the building. Our item was made up from notes furnished by one of the audience, and in speaking of the farce, said "it was almost too much for the audience," used in a connection that led us to infer that the farce was so provocative of mirth and enjoyment that the audience could hardly stand the fun. Our informant, however, says he was dead in earnest, and meant exactly opposite to our supposition. The rest of the programme, he again says, was very well rendered indeed.

Another Marriage.—The spirit of matrimony is abroad in the land. This time it is our popular and rising young songstress, Miss Sarah E. Olsen, who has become the happy bride of Mr. J. E. Langford, both of this city. The ceremony was performed to-day by Elder Joseph F. Smith, at the Endowment House. Mrs. Langford has many friends in this community, where she is as much admired for the excellent quality of her voice, as for her general disposition and many good traits of character. The young husband, who is the adopted son of Mr. Lorenzo Pettit, resides on the Jordan, a few miles in the suburbs. We wish the newly wedded pair all the joy and happiness they could ask for or desire.

Uncle Robert.—To-day, our good friend Brother Robert Carter, of the Ninth Ward, reached the ripe old age of eighty-two years. He is not quite so nimble as he has been, but retains his mental faculties and jovial spirit. For many years he has been known to Salt Lake public as a dispenser of current literature, and has tramped many miles a day in the pursuit of his calling. He is now unable to travel so far as formerly, but entertains the warmest feelings towards his patrons and numerous acquaintances. We wish Uncle Robert many happy returns of the day and a peaceful, quiet and blessed rest in his old age.

Home Wagon Work.—The Deseret Carriage and Wagon Company, near the Thirtieth Ward School-house, are turning out some splendid specimens of wagon and carriage work. A strong wagon for express work, for Park City, has just been finished, and a light wagon for White & Sons, the butchers, receiving the last touches of paint, are both commendable samples of the mechanical skill of the workmen of this establishment, who, under the superintendence of Mr. J.
