Evidence Showed that He Merely Acted in Self Defense in Alleged Assault.

The case of the State of Utah vs W. S. Kenyon, charged with having assaulted Lewis Domerud with a deadly weapon, came up for hearing before Justice of the Peace Parker J. Hall. The complaining witness, Domerud, was not in attendance at the hearing and could not be located by the sheriff, after diligent search. It is presumed he must have skipped out after swearing to the complaint, as no trace of his whereabouts can be found.

George Lee and Harry Jones were sworn and testified that Domerud came worn and testhetel on Monday even-ing in an intoxicated condition, and seemed to be bent on quarreling. In a chort time he got into words with Mr. Kenyon, the night clerk at the hotel, and threatened him. The defendant aft the foom and went to a restaurant aft the foom and went to a restaurant pear by, where he was followed by Domerud, who threatened to kill him if he got a hold of him. Kenyon selzed a piece of iron pipe and started for the hotel, but Domerud pounced upon him and he used the pipe to protect

Mr. Kenyon was sworn himself and testified to the facts as above stated, but said he only used the pipe in self-

The county attorney, after the testi-nony was heard, asked that the case mony was mean, asked that be dismissed, there not being sufficient testimony to hold the defendant to answer before a higher court, and the court dismissed the action as requested.
