### W. S. KENYON DISCHARGED

Evidence Showed that He Merely Acted in Self Defense in Alleged Assault.

Accused Ship's Town - Salt Lake Youngster in Trouble Before the Police Court.

The case of the State of Utah vs. W. S. Kenyon, charged with having assaulted Lewis Dornard with a deadly weapon, came up for hearing before Justice of the Peace Parker J. Hall. The complaining witness, Dornard, was not in attendance at the hearing and could not be located by the sheriff, after diligent search. It is presumed he must have skipped out after swearing to the complaint, as no trace of his whereabouts can be found.

George Lee and Harry Jones were sworn and testified that Dornard came to the Ogden Hotel on Monday evening in an intoxicated condition, and seemed to be bent on quarreling. In a short time he got into words with Mr. Kenyon, the night clerk at the hotel. The defendant attacked him, and the two men went to a restaurant near by, where he was followed by Dornard, who threatened to kill him. Kenyon hit him a blow on the head with a piece of iron pipe and started for the hotel, but Dornard pounced upon him and he used the pipe to protect himself.

Mr. Kenyon was sworn himself and testified to the facts as above stated, but said he only used the pipe in self-defense.

The county attorney, after the testimony was heard, asked that the case be dismissed, there not being sufficient testimony to hold the defendant to answer before a higher court, and the court dismissed the action as requested.

### IN POLICE COURT.

The fifteen-year-old boy who was arrested for breaking glass at the Southern Pacific building was the first on the docket. He confessed to having lied to the police about his name being Jones and his home at Dayton, and said that his name was William Quinn, and that he has a mother and several brothers and sisters residing at 28 North Second West Salt Lake. His relatives were notified, and until they are heard from he will remain at the city jail.

One drunk was sentenced to one day on the rock pile.

One vagrant was permitted to go on his promise to leave town.
