Brother Pratt goes on to say: "There is no doubt that the year of the ancient Israelites, who inhabited this continent, differed a little in length from our year, for they probably reckoned their's somewhat after the manner of the Jews, at Jerusalem, and the Jews had formed their reckoning from the Egyptians, among whom they dwelt some 400 years. The Egyptians reckoned 365 fays to the year, but the ancient Israelites on this continent, according to the records of the early Spanish historians, did not iconsider that 365 days made up a full year; hence at the end of every 52 years they added 13 days, which is equivalent to adding one day to every four years the

added 13 days, which is equivalent to adding one day to every four years the same as we do." If such were the reckoning of the ancient Nephites, then 33 years and three days of their time had passed away between the time of the Savior's birth and crucifixion. Now the Savior's birth and crucifixion. Now these 33 years and three days would, according to our reckoding, lack five days of 33 years. So ac o ding to this reckoning the anniversity of the Savior's birth would be on the 11th of April; besides in the revelations quoted in the article of yesterday (on page 130, also 131 of the Book of Doctrine and Covenants), we see the Church of Christ was orwe see the Church of Christ was or ganized 1830 years after the coming our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ i

our Lord and Sayior Jesus Christ in the flesh. In the new edition of the Book of Mormon, 3 Nephi, 8 chap., 2 verse, is the following: "And now it came to pass the 30 and 3rd year had passed away," etc. In the 5th year, in the first mouth, in the fourth day of the month, in the fourth day of the month, etc., was fulfilled the prophecy of Samuel, the Lamanite, who gave the sign of our Savior's death." (See Helaman, 14 chap., commencing at 20th verse.) I do not think our Savior was born on the 6th of April, and died on born on the 6th of April, and died on the same date. I think the Savior was born on the 11th of April and died on the 6th of April, in his 34th year, as the Book of Mormon says.

Also see the precise date of Christ's crucifixion, by a distinguished German scholar, Herr Kelk, copied by you from the N. Y. Evening Math, some time ago. It is as follows:

"A distinguished German scholar, Herr Kelk, in a recently published work, considers that he has settled the true date of the cructizion. He shows that there was a total ecilpse of the moon concomitant with the earthquake which occurred when Julius Cresar was assassinated, on the 15th of March, B. C. 44. He also calculated the Jowish calendar to A. D. 34, and the result of his researches confirms the fact recorded by the Evangelists of the wonderful physical events that accompanied the crucifixion. His astronomical calculations also show that on the 5th of April, A. D. 61, there was a total eclipse of the sun accompanied, in all probability, by the earthquake spoken of in Matthew.
