

DAMAGES, SIR; HEAVY DAMAGES.

Charles H. Moyer, President of Western Federation of Miners, Brings Suit for Them

AGAINST COLORADO OFFICIALS.

Defendants are ex-Governor Peabody, General Sherman Bell, and General Bulkeley Wells

Denver, April 3.—John M. Murphy, an attorney for Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, filed a complaint today in the United States court against James H. Peabody, former governor of Colorado; Sherman M. Bell, former adjutant-general, and Capt. Bulkeley Wells (now adjutant-general), who was military commander in Telluride while that city was under martial law.

Moyer alleges that he was subjected to hardships, humiliations and disgrace by the defendants without probable cause and also without legal process. He was also deprived, the complaint reads, of having a public and speedy trial by an impartial jury in the district in which the offense is alleged to have been committed.

The confinement, it is alleged, greatly impaired the plaintiff's health by reason of the extreme dampness and unwholesomeness of the jail. The complaint asserts that the defendants were guilty of malice, and that they should be imprisoned according to law. Moyer was held as a military prisoner. Damages in the sum of \$100,000 are demanded from each of the defendants.

AN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT.

Prominent Residents of Pittsburg Cut and Bruised.

Philadelphia, April 3.—Three prominent residents of Pittsburg were severely cut and bruised and a well known manufacturer of this city was dangerously hurt when an automobile in which the party was riding, collided with a street car. The party consisted of Charles S. Frishmuth, president of the Homer Brass company of this city; Archibald N. McCrea, president of the Union Spring Manufacturing company of Pittsburg; James McCrea, vice president of the Pennsylvania Coal company; W. B. Shoen of the Shoen Steel Wheel company of Pittsburg, and L. G. Wood, manager of the banking firm of Melton & Co., of Pittsburg.

The four men were taken to a hospital. Mr. Frishmuth was injured internally and sustained a serious concussion of the brain. Mr. McCrea has a deep wound in the scalp; Mr. Shoen was cut and bruised about the head, and Mr. Wood was bruised. The chauffeur escaped unhurt. In addition to their business and cuts the other members of the party are suffering from the shock. The trolley car was not damaged and none of the passengers were injured. Late tonight Mr. Frishmuth recovered consciousness at the hospital. It was stated that his condition, while still serious, is much improved.

Allen for the murder of her babe in Douglas county one year ago. Sheriff Lytle has also arrested Miss Allen's aunt, Mrs. Manda Dutton, and her two sons as accessories in the murder. J. T. COLEMAN ARRESTED. Charged With Killing Edna Hoffman at Portland, Or.

Chehalis, Wash., April 3.—John T. Coleman, the gambler, who killed a notorious woman named Edna Hoffman at Portland, Or., Saturday night by cutting her throat, was arrested here on the arrival of a train from Portland at 3:20 o'clock this morning. He was placed in jail by Marshal George Simonds and being left alone for a few minutes, slashed his throat with a razor which had been concealed on his person. His injuries are of a terrible nature, and there is little or no hope for his recovery. Both Coleman and his victim formerly lived in Spokane.

MANDATE DENIED. Cal. Supreme Court Refuses to Reinstate Expelled Senators.

San Francisco, April 3.—The state supreme court today denied an application for a writ of mandate to compel the restoration to office of State Senators Bunker French, Wright and Emerson, who were recently expelled from the state senate for accepting bribes to influence their votes in regard to legislation affecting building and loan associations.

MAYOR OF NEW YORK. Bill Passed to Extend His Term To Two Years.

Albany, N. Y., April 3.—The assembly tonight unanimously passed the bill making the term of office of the mayor of New York four years instead of two.

EMPEROR AT MINORCA. Everywhere He Was Given an Enthusiastic Reception.

Port Mahon, Island of Minorca, April 3.—The German emperor landed from the Hamburg-america liner Hamburg at 10:30 o'clock this morning, and visited the capital of the island. A hearty reception was given a hearty reception. The town and shipping were decorated with flags. The emperor returned on board the Hamburg at noon, and she sailed from here at 4:30 p. m. Before leaving, Emperor William said he wished to visit the Mediterranean next year.

UNREST IN WARSAW. Another General Strike Appears To be Imminent.

Warsaw, April 3.—Increasing unrest in labor circles is notable, and well-founded fears are of the opinion that another general strike is imminent. A large manufacturer in a neighboring town refused a big contract last week because after conferring with the leaders among his workmen he was convinced that all his employees would walk out within a month in spite of the manufacturer's assurance that the employment would be regular with himself by remaining to complete the contract. The governor-general has prohibited the sale of revolvers, pistols and cartridges throughout the whole territory under his administration. All the arms which were in the possession of the gun dealers have been handed over to the custody of the authorities.

WAR ON POOLROOMS. Grand Jury Starts One in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Cal., April 3.—The grand jury started its war on the poolrooms in earnest today. Nine arrests were made at a late afternoon session, nearly all the big poolrooms suspended business. Information of the grand jury's intention had reached the poolrooms in some manner, otherwise wholesale arrests would have been made. Foreman Andrews is greatly disappointed over the small number of arrests.

Children's Home Destroyed.

Coriscana, Tex., April 2.—Fire today destroyed the main building of the I. O. O. F. Widows and Children's home, together with its equipment. Loss, \$100,000. All the children are accounted for.

Expect Renewal of Fighting.

Gunshu Pass, April 3.—A renewal of fighting is expected shortly. The concentration of the Russian army is complete with its advance lines south of the station of Spinghal, 74 miles north of the pass. The Japanese are screening their movements well by means of cavalry, and it is difficult to locate the bulk of their army. A heavy movement seems to be in progress on the Russian flanks. The railroad station at Changtun, 40 to 50 miles above the pass, is occupied by Japanese artillery, but so far as is ascertained, it does not cover a large body of troops.

Machen et al Indicted.

Washington, April 3.—The federal grand jury today returned indictments against William G. Corbett, August W. Machen and George E. Lorenz on a charge of conspiracy in connection with the purchase of straps for mail pouches. An indictment under the same charge was returned against the same individual in 1903, and which time the name of Mrs. Lorenz was included with the others. The present indictments differ from the former only in the omission of the name of Mrs. Lorenz.

McMaster Will be Consul.

Washington, April 3.—The marital difficulties of Dr. Frederick McMaster, recently appointed consul to Zanibar, today were adjusted, the doctor providing for the support of his child by his first wife. He probably will receive his commission in a day or two.

RUSSIA'S HOPES CENTERED IN FLEET.

If Rejstevsky Gains a Victory Over Japanese May Change the Whole Situation.

NO PEACE AT ANY PRICE WANTED

Ambassador McCormick Says Official Circles Want to Continue the War.

New York, April 4.—Robert S. McCormick, newly appointed American ambassador to France, who has just arrived in Paris from St. Petersburg, says he is surprised at the report that there is a desire to conclude peace at any price manifested in official circles, cables the Paris correspondent of the Herald. According to Ambassador McCormick, no such desire exists in St. Petersburg.

"On the contrary in official circles there is," he said, "a general desire to continue the war to the bitter end, and there are great hopes that Admiral Rejstevsky will meet the Japanese fleet and gain a victory which may in one day change the entire aspect of the war. 'All the hopes of Russia are now centered in that fleet and its encounter with the Japanese squadron is looked forward to with confidence. 'Reports of American intervention in the matter are without the slightest foundation."

DEAD OF APOPLEXY. S. N. Nixon Was to be Put on Trial for Murder Today.

Lockhart, Tex., April 3.—S. N. Nixon, a prominent politician and lawyer, died today of apoplexy, induced by nervous collapse. He was on his way to court for trial on the charge of murdering R. W. Malone and Capt. J. L. Yeasay at Luling in a street fight a year ago, was set for trial today.

BOTH ARMS CUT OFF. Boy Jumps from Train at Sparks, Nev., With Terrible Results.

Reno, Nev., April 3.—Francis Cunningham, 15 years of age, had both arms cut off while jumping from a train at Sparks last night. One arm was severed above the elbow, and in trying to extricate himself the other was caught just above the elbow. Two tramps witnessed the accident and reported it. His recovery is very doubtful.

Attempt to Wreck S. P. Train.

Albany, Or., April 3.—Two attempts were made here during last night to wreck the Southern Pacific southbound overland train from Portland. A freight train, northbound, was derailed by a pile of ties on the track one mile north of the city. Later a second pile of ties was found on the track one-third of a mile further north, all the obstructions placed so as to wreck the train coming south. The obstructions were removed, and as the overland passed several shots were fired at the engine. This morning shot-guns were found on the track. This is the second attempt to wreck the overland in two weeks.

Woman Beaten to Death.

Ottawa, Kan., April 3.—Mrs. Carolina Job, the aged patient in a local sanatorium, who was horribly beaten and left unconscious in her room last week, died today of her injuries. There is still no clue to her assailant.

Found Dead in Bed.

Berkeley, Cal., April 3.—Mrs. Lella Batterman, the wealthy widow of the late T. S. Batterman, a well known mining man, was found dead in her bed at her home on Channing way today. Death resulted from asphyxiation. The gas was found turned fully on and the door of the room was locked from the inside. No note was found in the room and whether death resulted accidentally or not is not known.
