Last year 2,230,956 postage stamps were issued for the London Times, and 104,648 for the Standard.

The convicts at Sing Sing are exultant over a change by which bread has been substituted for "mush and molasses" as the evening meal.

The richest man in Vienna is Baron Sina, the banker. His wealth is believed to be much greater than that of any member of the Rothschild family.

A Western paper having announced the "shooting of a wildcat by a little boy five feet eight inches long," an exchange queries "what they call big boys there?"

A missionary in Brownsville, Texas, has succeeded in uniting all the Protestants—"Episcopalians, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Lutherans"—in one Congregational Church.

George Washington, a negro charged with mule stealing, escaped from the Mayor's court in Richmond, Va., on Tuesday. He was pursued and recaptured by Andrew Jackson and Thomas Jefferson, both negroes.

George D. Prentice has been a newspaper writer since the year 1830. He universally writes with a lead pencil. The estimate has been made that in that time he has used twenty-nine miles of pencil points.

Celone Gowan, the American who raised the vessels sunk by order of the Russian Government in the entrance to the harbor of Sebastopol, is going to the allied fleet, is going to try to raise the Spanish treasure vessels sunk in Vigo bay by the English in 1702.

London has thirteen Mary Ann streets, forty-seven James, thirty-seven Edward, forty-six Charles, twenty-four Frederick, thirty-six Henry, eighty-seven John, fifty-eight Elizabeth, thirteen Jane, four Emma, and seven Emily streets. There are fifty-two New streets.

The thirteen or fifteen individuals found guilty at Burgos, Spain, of the assassination of the Governor of that town, have just been sentenced to imprisonment and hard labor for life. The arrest has also just been effected at Burgos of the carpenter who is said to have given the fatal blow to M. Castro. There was found in his possession a hammer covered with blood, which is supposed to be the instrument of the crime.

The Observatore Romano says that his Holiness Pius IX. is now engaged in negotiations with General Grant, with a view to sending a nuncio to Washington. This prelate would not only represent the Court of Rome in the capital of the United States, but would also exercise an influence upon Catholicism in that country, which, in the opinion of the Observatore, is destined to supersede all other religions, and to control the conscience of nine-tenths of the American people.

When the Erie Canal was built it was designed for vessels of 90 tons. Since it has been enlarged for those of 250 tons, and the proposition now is to make it for ships of 1,000 tons, and these would not meet the increasing demands for freight. Of the traffic with the West the Erie canal carries more than all the railroads from the St. Lawrence to the Potomac. A single canal boat will equal the tonnage of a freight train.

A "Calico Dress Party" was recently given at Plymouth, Minn. A prize in greenbacks, offered to the lady wearing the best worsted and newest dress, was judged by a committee of three dress-makers rightfully belonging to Mrs. S. H. Little, of Northville, and was presented accordingly. The dress was composed of figured pink calico, gored make, waist and sleeves puffed, and trimmed with light pink white centre stripe, and three rows on the bottom and sleeves.

Several English papers state that the recent conduct of the liberated Fenian convicts has had the effect of rendering further clemency in that direction unlikely. Notices of motion which had been given in favor of the convicts still in custody have been withdrawn, at the request of the Irish Church Secretary and Attorney-General, and in certain cases actually under the consideration of the Executive, all proceedings have been abandoned, owing to the outrageous speeches of the released convicts and their sympathizers.
