

ORCHARD AND WM. D. HAYWOOD

Former May Have Committed Crimes but Latter Not Connected With Them.

RICHARDSON PRAISES W. F. M.

Reveres the Flag as Much as Any Combination of Capitalists—Something Behind Prosecution.

Boise, July 22.—For four hours and a half today E. F. Richardson pleaded with the jury for the life of William D. Haywood. Under order of the court the hours for the day's sessions were changed, and in place of sitting in the afternoon, court met at 6 o'clock this evening. Judge Wood was informed by the jury that the extreme heat of the courtroom was too trying on some of the jurymen, and complied with the request for a late evening session.

The preliminary hearing of the case of Dr. L. L. McGee, one of the witnesses for the defense, charged with perjury, came up this afternoon, and will be continued tomorrow. Orchard was on the stand for over an hour, and was given a severe grilling in the cross-examination by McGee's counsel. The prisoner witness, however, maintained his characteristic calm throughout. He denied that he was in the Court of Appeals at the time McGee swore to a meeting with him at Wallace.

C. W. Allen, the other witness for the defense, who is under perjury charges, was today bound over for trial in the district court.

The excellent character and consistent philanthropy of the Western Federation of Miners, the patient suffering of labor under the lash of capital, and the perjury and perfidy of Harry Orchard were the main points in the opening argument in defense of William D. Haywood, presented today by E. F. Richardson.

In spite of the sweltering atmosphere every seat in the courtroom was occupied long before the opening of the session. Haywood's mother sat beside the prisoner, the invalid wife, daughter and sister and stepfather composed the family group, and seven of the battery of Haywood's counsel were in their places.

EVENING SESSION.

At the evening session of court Mr. Richardson said he would do all he could to abridge his remarks, on account of the intense heat, and believed he would be able to conclude some time tomorrow.

The contention of the defense, Richardson declared, is that no matter whether Orchard committed the crimes to which he confessed or not, no connection has been shown between Orchard and the defendant at bar. Concluding his discussion of the vindicator rline explosion, he charged the jury again that the preponderance of testimony showed it to be an accident.

Orchard's testimony as to receiving money from the Western Federation of Miners for crime was not corroborated by a single witness. Mr. Richardson asserted, and should not be considered. Both Moyer and Haywood denied that they had ever given Orchard money, and the state had failed to show any fund from which such money could have been paid. As to the value of their testimony, Mr. Richardson said Moyer and Haywood stand in practically the same light as Harry Orchard and are entitled to the same belief.

As to the coming of the mine to Cripple Creek, Atty. Richardson said they came at the behest and in the service of the Mine Owners' association, whose members were assessed so much a month to buy the certificates of indebtedness issued by the state.

Referring to Moyer's arrest at Telluride for desecration of the flag, Richardson declared the 13 statehoods Moyer had printed on the folds of "Old Glory" were indubitable truths, and would be shown as truths when applied to evidence in the Haywood case.

"And as to 'Old Glory,' I want to tell you men that the flag is as much thought of and as much revered by the Western Federation of Miners as by any combination of capitalists who use it for their purpose in any part of the world."

Mr. Richardson declared that while under the ruling of the court he was not allowed to discuss the deportations from Cripple Creek or the employment of detectives in the various miners' unions, he wanted to draw as much as possible on conditions in Colorado.

"I want to trace to your minds the thought that will come to you when we reach the tragic event at Caldwell so you will understand why we have on the one side Harry Orchard, finely dressed and clothed and in security, although he is the confessed murderer of your late governor, and on the other the effort to take the blood of these men—to get them out of the state at the instigation of the state—for the benefit of those whose names I shall mention hereafter. What I want you men to know is that if these men were guilty of the crimes charged against them in Colorado they would long ago have been called to account to Colorado law."

Mr. Richardson dismissed the murder of Detective Lyte Gregory in Denver with the statement that absolutely nothing was shown to connect the Western Federation of Miners with the crime.

The attorney here said that such corroboration of Orchard as had been produced reminded him of the story of a Chicago man who during the world's fair remained away from home all night. When taken to task by his wife, he declared said hiccups that he had gone up in the Ferris wheel and the wheel had got stuck. His wife said she could not accept such an explanation.

"Why, my dear, if you don't believe it," said the man, "I'll take you out and show you the wheel."

Next in the consideration of the attorney came the blowing up of the Independence depot. He demanded to

Knows why young Neville, who was said by Orchard to have been with him the day of the explosion, was brought to Boise but never put upon the stand to corroborate the confessing witness.

"There is something behind this prosecution," declared Richardson. "But I do not mean Mr. Hawley or Senator Borah. I have no fault to find with them. I think that the jury, the court and everyone will say that in the main this case has been tried fairly and decently by the attorneys on both sides. But somewhere there is an influence which kept young Neville off the stand."

Richardson charged that the Independence depot explosion was the result of a plot by the mine owners to extirpate, root and branch, the Western Federation of Miners, which was trying to control wages and secure work for its members under proper conditions.

Answering Mr. Hawley's taunt in his opening address why the defense had not put Steve Adams on the stand, Richardson declared he wanted to be perfectly frank.

"It would have been a case of dog eat dog, and Hawley and Borah knew it. Under the same influences that worked on Orchard they secured a confession from Adams which he repudiated. They have the confession and we have the repudiation. The whole truth, gentlemen, is that one was afraid to put him on the stand and the other didn't dare to."

"In passing here I want also to say that the only reason Moyer was not put on the stand is that not one scintilla of evidence was brought here to connect him with any crime except the unsupported word of Orchard. As to George Pettibone, he will take the stand at his own trial and explain satisfactorily the transactions he had with Orchard."

Mr. Richardson said there was no evidence whatsoever to connect Haywood with the attempted (if there were any) on the life of Fred Bradley in San Francisco. As to Pettibone sending money to Orchard while there, that was something to be explained at the trial of Pettibone. The defense contends that Orchard left some of his own money with Pettibone.

Richardson spent the last half hour of the evening session in providing an explanation of the explosion at the Bradley residence in San Francisco. He argued the impossibility of a bomb explosion, but insisted that a reservoir for escaping gas had been formed in the walls and under the flooring and that when it came in contact with the lighted cigar the explosion occurred and at the point of least resistance under the mat in the outer porch the flooring was torn up. He scoffed at the evidence that a lighted cigar would not ignite gas and told the jury that in the east it was possible to run the finger down the carpet and then put it into the gas jet and light it.

In conclusion counsel said that in his opinion Orchard, the typical wanderer and tin horn gambler, read of the explosion and adopted it as his own. In any case, Mr. Richardson said in this case in every other part of the world, testimony, there was not a scintilla of evidence to connect Haywood with the incident.

At this point in the argument court adjourned at 8:45 until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, when Mr. Richardson will continue.

KILLED HIS BRIDE.

Camden, N. J., July 22.—Following a quarrel, Mrs. Alice Bruce aged 18 years, a bride of several weeks was shot and instantly killed at her home today by her husband, Frederick Bruce, who then fatally shot himself. Bruce quarreled with his wife because she remained away from home until late at night without his consent.

PIOT CAST KOREAN THRONE

An Elder Statesman Member of Imperial Household and Others Arrested.

EX-EMPEROR TAKING A HAND.

Induces Successor Not to Sign Proclamation Intended to Calm the People and Restore Order.

Seoul, Korea, July 22.—A discovery of a plot against the throne resulted in the arrest today of one of the elder statesmen of Korea, together with Pak Yung Ho, who yesterday was appointed minister of the imperial household; Yi Do Chai, grand chamberlain, of the former emperor, and four Korean officers.

The intervention of the former emperor in the affairs of today is evidenced by the fact that he prevailed upon his son, the present emperor, to refuse his signature to a proclamation by the cabinet, the object of which was to calm the people and restore order. Furthermore, the appointment of Pak Yung Ho is another evidence of the refusal of the deposed sovereign to surrender power, and there is reason to believe he is planning to precipitate an outbreak on his own reserve.

The minister of war has reported to Marquis Ho, the Japanese resident general, that he has no control over or communication with the army. The former emperor is responsible for four anti-Japanese conspiracies since his abdication. The first conspiracy consisted in ordering the imperial guard to rush the palace upon the night of July 19; the second is found in the defiance of the minister of war by the Korean army; the third as the attack upon the police at the great bell, which the Japanese have proof to show was led by an armed officer, and the fourth consists in his indirect manipulation of the functions of the present emperor.

One Japanese was wounded in the encounter in front of the great bell yesterday.

Two villas belonging to deposed members of the former cabinet were burned last night. An electric plant is now under guard and all night long the Japanese town was under the vigilance of five patrols.

Police reserves have arrived from Tokyo.

Sensational rumors are current that three cruisers, with ability to land 1,000 blue jackets, are making their way to Chungking.

The Japanese residency general places the whole responsibility for the arrests made this morning on the throne, disclaiming intervention which, it is asserted, would be an unnecessary invasion into affairs which are purely Korean. On account of the fact that every Japanese soldier here is needed to guard the barracks of the Korean troops, guards have been refused to West houses of foreigners in the suburbs and their occupants, who have been threatened in anonymous communications, have been given refuge in the foreign quarter of the city.

IRON MINERS ORDERED OUT.

St. Paul, July 22.—A special to the Dispatch from Hibbing, Minn., says: "The Western Federation of Miners has ordered out on a strike all the miners employed by the United States Steel company here."

JAMES J. HILL SUE FOR TEN MILLION DOLLARS

St. Paul, Minn., July 22.—Clarence H. Venner, of New York wants James J. Hill to account for and discharge an alleged profit of \$10,000,000 which Venner claims Hill made in the dealwhehe by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railway companies acquired the capital stock of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy.

Venner began a suit against Hill and the Great Northern Railway company in the United States district court in Chicago, the complaint being filed late today, in which he alleges that Hill wrongfully and fraudulently, while acting in his capacity as president of the Great Northern Railway company, acquired stock of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railway at prices averaging about \$150 per share, and that he stole a total of 30,000 shares, has been launched. The plan is being backed principally by the Northwest Consolidated District of the Machinists' union, although the blacksmiths and boiler makers, who also have powerful organizations, are looked to for active co-operation on behalf of their respective crafts. The northwest consolidated district embraced all railroads north of the Union Pacific lines and west of Chicago.

A demand will be made upon them to make the nine-hour day effective Sept. 1. For this purpose officials of the machinists' union are now preparing formal notices to be served upon the railroad companies at the beginning of next month, thus giving them 30 days in which to consider the plan. Among the railroads to be asked to establish the nine-hour day are the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern, Soo Line, Minneapolis and St. Paul, Iowa Central, Wisconsin Central, Chicago & Northwestern, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, Chicago Great Western and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul.

CARMEN STOPPED WORK

Chicago, July 22.—The Railroad Carmen's union, comprising car repairers, carpenters, cleaners and laborers, declared a strike yesterday against the Rock Island lines, and 280 men employed in the repair shops at Moline, Rock Island and Davenport, stopped work until one of their number is reinstated with full pay from the time he was discharged to date of reinstatement.

The men employed in the repair shops had been in the habit of being ready to leave the shops when the whistle announced time to stop work. In order to accomplish this it was necessary for them to stop work 10 minutes earlier in order to wash up. The company posted rules forbidding the practice on penalty of discharge.

A painter at East Moline was found washing up 10 minutes before the hour for stopping work, and was discharged. He reported to the grievance

committee of the union, which in turn held a conference with the railroad officials, demanding the reinstatement of the discharged man, with full pay for the time he was off duty. The executives were willing to give the man another chance, but refused to give him full pay for the time he was off.

AN ALL NIGHT COURT.

New York's Will Begin Its Sessions August 1.

New York, July 22.—The all-night court, a new feature of New York life, will begin its session on Aug. 1. Magistrate Whitman, who was instrumental in having the legislature create the new court, will have the honor of presiding at the opening session. The three principal reforms that the new court will bring about, according to Magistrate Whitman, are these: First, abolition of the professional bondsmen evil; second, checking the "shake-down" by police of persons arrested at night, and third, and the suffering of a night's imprisonment in a filthy police station and the expense of whom a magistrate may admit to bail.

A WOMAN BURGLAR.

Made the Excuse That She Robbed to Keep Her Mother.

Chicago, July 22.—A mild-mannered, neatly groomed woman, said by the police to be a daring burglar, was arrested yesterday, and plunder worth \$3,000 found in the apartments where she lived with her husband, a clerk in a downtown drug store, and their 8-year-old daughter. The woman is accused of more than a score of burglaries on the north side in the last month.

The accused woman is Mrs. Nellie Hantz, 46 years old. She was captured as she was leaving a flat in Center street. In a satchel which she carried were found a half dozen gold watches, several diamond rings and other jewelry. Nearly 50 skeleton keys were also in the satchel.

In her room the police recovered jewelry, silverware, clothing and household goods in profusion, most of which was identified by residents in the neighborhood. Her husband, Thomas J. Hantz, denied that he knew anything of his wife's crimes. He was held, however, as an accessory.
