Miss Vanderbilt's personal fortune, inherited from her father, the late Cornelius Vanderbilt, is \$12,500,000 to which is to be added a check to the count for \$5,000,000 from his bride's family. In further addition there will be many thousands of dollars expended for gifts to the bride, all of which will find their way to Hungary.
