Question of Expense Seems to be Only Drawback, but Recommendations on This Point Are Also Made.

Urging that a detention home be eatablished by Salt Lake county, the juvenile court commission presented a strong letter to the board of county commissioners yesterday, after a meeting yesterday afternoon in the governor's office.

The opinion of Judge Ogden Hiles, former city attorney, regarding the juvenile court law as recently passed by the state legislature, has said, in reply to a question from Mayor Bransford, that it is unconstitutional. This places burden upon the county and the city is asked to pay for the expenses. Legal authority to incur this expense has not been found and the city so far bas been unable to reach an agreement with the county, although Mayor Bransford has said that the city will pay for the care of its juveniles who may be sent to the detention home and school.

SUCH A HOME NEEDED.

It is the desire of the commission and the juvenile court efficers in this city to establish a model institution. It is pointed out by the court in Salt Lake that such a home might be made self-supporting in many ways. Clerk J. U. Eldredge, Sr., in speaking along the line eave

"The need for such a home is so apparent that I wonder that people ask why such an institution is needed. There are homes in Salt Lake, and in all cities, so far as that goes, where children are not surrounded by proper conditions. The result is that instead of populating the country with good citizens, the home surroundings of so many children are such that they turn out bad, not because they are bad at heart, but because their minds are bent on viciousness when they are young.

young. "It is not right to send good child-"It is not right to send good child-ren to a reform school because their parents are unfit to educate them and control them. Their contact with bad boys and girls in a reform school has been shown to have a bad effect on them throughout their life. The re-form school leaves a mark on their records just as a convict has when he leaves prison, though he may have completely reformed while a prisoner.

WOULD MEET CONDITION. "The detention home is to meet this

condition. The home would be a home in every sense of the word. A good man and woman would be placed at in every sense of the word. A good man and woman would be placed at its head to exercise a proper control over the children. There would be establish-ed in the home a graded school where the children would be educated along the same lines as followed in the city schools. This is a manifest need. The boys and girls would have spare time for games, play and recreation of all sort, but idleness would not be encour-aged, nor would there be opportunity for it. Boys would be taught carpen-tering, blacksmithing, typewriting, bookkeeping, farming, gardening--in short, the home would provide for all future needs of the young citizens. The girls would not be neglected eith-er. The home and school would offer them opportunities to learn domestic arts, cookery, housekeeping, sewing and other needful accomplishments to make them usaful women. They, too, would be fitted to take up office work and in other ways to earn their own living if necessity might demand. The home is a wead "Theremente of the

with flith and squalor. Her five chil-dren, ranging in age from 12 to 2 years, were dirty, ragged and stunted with neglect and insufficient food. Some of the children were brought into the juvenile court this afternoon, but all that can be done is to return them to the home with its miserable surround-ings. There is no other place for them, Such incidents are happening all the time. The father, in this case, was out of the state."

SWINE PLAGUE PREVALENT.

Several Weber County Towns Report* ed to be Badly Affected.

Swine plague is reported prevalent in Weber county, particularly at North Ogden, Pleasant View and Immediate localities, and the state board of health is asked to investigate. Veterian Frede marian Predetokison of the situation: "I was called to Pleasant View a few days ago to investigate an out-break of disease among hogs. I find that the hogs are affected with swine plague. The lesions show that the disease is well developed. I obtained some cultures and expect to isolate the germ. I Investigated a number of outbreaks around Pleasant View and North Ogden and my opinion is that swine plague has a very strong hold in that locality. Is there any-thing the state board of health can do in this regard? I think quaran-tine measures should be adopted and all the affected premises should be quarantined. LAW ON THE SUBJECT

The juvenile court law provides: In counties containing cities of the irst or of the second class, there may e established and maintained a detenschool, not connected with any jail, which shall be in charge of a su-perintendent. The county establishing and maintaining such de-tention school shall be entitled to re-cover from the citles of the first and of the second class, situated in said county, such sum for the care and maintenance of such child as may be reasonable therefor, and in no case shall such sum be less than the per capita monthly or yearly amount of such expense in the detention school in which the child is committed, or if the actual expense incurred by the county jail, which shall be in charge of a su

which the child is committee, of it the actual expense incurred by the county for the care and maintenance of such child. Said amounts paid by cities of the first and of the second class for the care and maintaenance of children from these cities sent to the detention school shall be paid monthly. ed.

That George A. Smythe, Jr., was op erating in good faith when he took \$9 from each of a number of Austrians, in exchange for securing them positions in Milner, Ida., is the explanation he offers to the charge of taking money without having actual positions to give

without having actual positions to give those who apply. With his attorney, A. J. Weber, Mr. Smythe appeared yesterday before County Atty. Willard Hansen and ex-plained the case. Of the \$9 charged each man, \$5.25 went for railroad fare for the trip to Milner, and only 75 cents to the employment agent. The follow-ing letter from G. W. Smith, who or-dered up the Austrians, explains what happened when they arrived: "Milner, Ida., Jan. 20, 1908. "Smyth R. R. Etyployment Agency, Sait Lake City. Utah. "Gontlemen: The Austrians you sent arrived, and after receiving instructions to stay in town and let their interpre-ier go out to camp and make some arrangements with the camp man to bring balaface out, they all walked off to camp, leaving their beds and bag-gage here.

"The camp was not in shape to ac-"The camp was not in shape to ac-commodite them. We offered them the best we had, and while we could not use all of them just now, owing to some changes in my work, we would to some changes in my work, we would use them as we could, and try and got some of the other camps to use some of them.
