

LOCAL ITEMS.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—Elder J. C. Little referred to his early connection with the Church, and the testimonies which he received, when called to accompany the Pioneers, that President Brigham Young was the man chosen by the Lord to preside over the Church. He also related instances, which occurred in these valleys, of his having been sent to perform certain duties, and having promises made to him which he could not believe at the time would be fulfilled; yet they were verified to the very letter, proving that the inspiration of the Lord directed them, and giving an assurance that evidence of the divine authority which directs through the Priesthood will follow obedience to its requirements.

Elder George Q. Cannon spoke of the movement now being made in favor of education, and urged the importance of the Saints being prepared for the great events that are rapidly approaching, by acquiring and storing up all the useful knowledge which they can obtain. He also urged upon mothers the great importance of the responsibilities placed upon them in training the young minds committed to their care.

Afternoon. President B. Young instructed the congregation on various principles, and pointed out the best course to be adopted with regard to caring for our poor. They are very few in number, but they have to be provided for; and in drawing their support from the General Tithing Store much time is lost which might be usefully employed and turned to productive advantage. He recommended the Bishops to look after the poor in their various wards, to find a suitable place in each ward where they can reside and be comfortable, to find employment for the sisters at knitting, sewing, crocheting, lace-making, and similar kinds of work which they can do; and to find something for the brethren to do, who are not able to go out and cut and saw wood, or do any heavy labor, at bottoming chairs, making door mats of flags, weaving willow baskets, and such kinds of employment.

He referred to the origin of fast days in the Church, and their objects, one of which was to have the food of every kind that was saved by fasting donated for the use of the poor; and showed that if the flour, meat, fruit, &c., saved by one day's fasting of the whole community in a month, were placed in the hands of the Bishops for the poor, there would be more than enough to supply the wants of every person in the Territory, whose necessities would give them a claim upon the liberality of their richer brethren and sisters.

He also recommended that Female Relief Societies be immediately formed in the various wards, to look after the poor and minister to their wants.

His concluding remarks were on the subject of education, the value of which he impressed upon the congregation.

THEATRICAL.—The performance on Saturday night was very successful. The weather was more favorable and there was a very good house. Mr. Couldock's Master Walter was, as we expected, an exceedingly fine portraiture. Miss Couldock merits great praise for her natural and vivid playing in Julia. The character is a most pleasing one, and takes a firm hold upon the sympathies of the audience, while it affords fine scope for fresh, youthful and vigorous powers of impersonation. Miss Couldock's Julia was neither hackneyed nor stagey; its only fault was a trifle too much force in the fourth act, and a trifle too little in the early part of the fifth act, the overmastering power of the frenzy which seizes her, as she realizes the irretrievable steps which she feels she is forced to take, not being marked with that distinctness which invites comparison between it and the melting tenderness or wounded pride that characterize her interview with Clifford in the previous act. All that Miss Couldock requires is time, to give to the character that study which it requires, to make her impersonation of it most finished. Miss Adams was very warmly greeted on her re-appearance after her sickness. Her Helen was very good; so were Mr. Lindsay's Clifford, Mr. Graham's Modus, and Mr. Dunbar's Pathom.

Miss Nunn sang a pretty ballad, was loudly encored, reappeared and sang another song.

In the farce of "Bowling Out," Messrs. Margetts, Graham and Maiben, Mrs. Clawson, Miss Alexander and Miss Colebrook, played with much fidelity and spirit.

To-morrow evening Shakespeare's great play of Henry IV. will be performed. This has been called by competent critics Shakespeare's greatest play; and though he evidently designed Hotspur for the leading character, the keen satire, biting wit, humor, repartee and peculiar characteristics of Falstaff have made him decidedly the great feature of the play. Yet every character in it is distinctly marked, and affords scope for good acting, while the fiery and impetuous Hotspur with the unconsciousness of the fat knight, Sir John, give them a prominence which cannot be reached by any of the others. The bills tell us that this is the greatest dramatic treat of the season, and there is no doubt of it. Mr. Couldock's Falstaff alone will afford a treat such as we seldom have an opportunity of witnessing here.
