## FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Eastern War News.

LONDON, 4.—A Vienna dispatch

revealing the operations in Bulgaria,

says, there is believed to be

certain jealousy between the Turk-

ish commander Osman Pasha, Sul-

timan Pasha and Mehmet Ali

Pasha, which prevents their work-

ing thoroughly in concert.

A Russian official dispatch an-

nounces that the Russians have re-

occupied Sultun Kaleh.

The Albanian coast is now clear

of Turks, and the insurrection in

the interior has been suppressed.

The army under Grand Duke Ni-

cholas will resume the offensive

against the Bulgarians, and the

Csarowitch will remain on the de-

fensive, confronting Mehmet Ali

Pasha.

The Russians are continually re-

ceiving reinforcements, and provi-

sions are being prepared for a new

Russian corps, numbering 20,000

men, now entering Roumania.

The Turks threaten the plain of

Edirne and have made reconnoi-

sances as far as Aris River.

A Vienna correspondent tele-

graphs that the Russian General

Richter has ordered the purchase of

building material for a barracks for

200,000 men, half of which are to

be erected in Bulgaria. All the

engineers have been ordered to pre-

pare for a regular siege of Rus-

ch.

The Russians officially estimate

their losses at the Schipka Pass at

1,200 killed and 3,000 wounded.

A correspondent at Vienna says,

trouble is expected in Thessaly.

A state of siege was proclaimed

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
