Bribery and Intimidation.

charge of attempted bribery and intim-

idation. Mr. Lords was not a witness that would make much of an impres-

sion upon a jury, and although he was an eyewitness to the murder his testi-

mony was not given with that straightforwardness that might be ex-

pected from a free, unhampered wit-ness. It was evident that he had been

approached with a view of influencing his testimony. He declared that upon three separate occasions he had been

approached by parties in Emery county since August last and offered two

hundred acres of land in case of Fred Mickle's acquittal. It had in connection

therewith been intimated that should Fred "hang" there were enough left for revenge, and he was left to draw

his own conclusions. It is likely that the district attorney, W. D. Livings-

ton, will make a searching investiga-

The Mickle brothers were both on the stand today. Peter Mickle was brought here from the penitentiary

where he is serving on a conviction for grand larceny. His testimony and that of the defendant were practically identical. On the evening of the kill-ing Peter and Fred Mickle had visited

ing Peter and Fred Mickie had visited the Court saloon. On entering they found the proprietor, Lew M. Link, and H. P. Ottoson playing cards. They went to the card table and asked the price of "getting in." being told, they wanted to play for money which Otto-

son declined to do; words passed be-tween Link and the Mickles, and the

former left and went behind the bar. Choice epithets were exchanged for a

time, but soon all seemed quiet. Link offered to shake hands but Peter

offered to shake hands but Peter Mickle refused on account of previous threats and the passing of vile language. Then the proprietor pulled his gun on Peter Mickle at which Mickle plead with him not to shoot. Fred Mickle, standing by his brother, exclaimed, "This has gone far enough,"

claimed, "This has gone far enough, picked up a glass from the bar and threw it at Link, hitting him in the face, and at once taking his knife from his pocket, struck him in the right breast. Link instantly died.

The defendant sets up a plea of self-denefuse, declaring that it was to save

the life of his brother Peter and that of himself that induced the attack.

The testimony given by eyewitnesses, outside of the Mickles, is in some re-

spects quite different. No one had seen the gun pointed at Mickle at all, though one of the state's witnesses had

heard Peter Mickle say several times, "Put down that gun." The weapon was found at the dead man's feet, so it is evident he had it when death


