The committee on credentials reported the names of the precinct delegates entitled to seats in the convention. The report was adopted and the committee on permanent organization offered the following report, which was also adopted:

We, your committee on permanent organization and order of business, beg leave to submit the following report:

We recommend for permanent chairman Judge C. F. Loofbrow, with the following vice-presidents: J. M. Breeze, John Sands, Henry Buhring, A. H. Kelly, W. S. McCormick, C. L. Hughes, John J. Daly, W. P. Noble, John H. Hinman, B. K. Block. For permanent secretary, W. G. Van Horne. For assistant secretaries or tellers, Frank Shelton, Jno. L. May, J. D. Adams and John Rogers. For reading clerk, T. W. Wampler. For sergeant-at-arms, Walter L. Sherman; assistant sergeant-at-arms, Wm. Doxie; Dan Wolstenholme, Walter Wiscomb, Will Nealy.

As to the order of business we recommend.

- 1—Report of committee on credentials.
- 2—Report of committee on permanent organization and order of business.
- 3—Report of the committee on resolutions.
- 4—Selection of a chairman of the city Liberal committee.
- 5—Selection of the five members of the city central committee, consisting of J. J. Greenwald, Allen E. Campbell, Samuel Galleguzzi, H. V. Meloy, Elijah Sells; also a chairman.
- 6—Nomination of a candidate for mayor.
- 7—Nomination of a candidate for recorder.
- 8—Nomination of a candidate for treasurer.
- 9—Nomination of a candidate for assessor and collector.
- 10—Nomination for marshal.
- 11—Miscellaneous business.
- 12—Adjournment.

Your committee further recommend that the vote for every officer named shall be by ballot, and that no candidate shall be declared the choice of this convention until he shall have received a majority over all the ballots cast.

We further recommend that each precinct in this convention select a secretary who shall collect the ballots for his precinct, and that the result of the ballot shall be declared by the chairman of the precinct delegation.

A Tribune printer and an individual named Updegraff escorted Judge Loofbrow. That gentleman made a brief speech, after which the following resolutions were adopted:

THE RESOLUTIONS.

The Liberal party, after two years of stewardship in Salt Lake City, while not

claiming that no mistakes have been made, that none of the trusted have proved unfaithful, does claim a mighty advance, and asks for the continued support of its friends. Its opponents have no criticism to offer. For the first time in political history the party in power is so loved by its enemies that they desire and are earnestly seeking, at the hands of the Legislative authority, power to keep an adverse administration in office.

It points exultingly to the increased efficiency of the free schools, to free water distributed alike to every resident, to the enforcement of sanitary regulations that have vastly increased the comfort and health of the city; to a perfect fire department; to improved streets and sidewalks, to an equal assessment of taxes, to an exact accounting for every dollar of the public money expended. It glories over the material advancement of the city, and the thoroughness of the work which it has performed in beginning the change necessary to convert a hamlet into a city.

It appeals for the continued confidence of the people on the score that it has in all its acts been true to American principles, that all its efforts have been for the promotion of the best interests of the city and Territory and of every inhabitant there. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we affirm our determination to administer the government of the city on the broad ground of exact justice to every citizen.

Resolved, That the improvements now in progress and new improvements in accord with modern requirements should be promoted to the full limit of reasonable expenditures;

Resolved, That good streets and pavements are a necessary adjunct to progress in a city; and therefore we commend these improvements in particular; also,

Resolved, That we approve the work already done in the way of increasing and more evenly distributing the water supply, and that it should continue until all complaints should die for want of cause;

Resolved, That we commend the Liberal management of our free schools and urge the granting of every possible facility for their improvement;

Resolved, That we urge the speedy passage in the legislature of the bill known as the mechanics' lien law;

Resolved, That eight hours should, by law, constitute a day's labor on all public works;

Resolved, That free employment offices should be established and that the demands of intelligent organized labor should always be received with hearty and serious consideration;

Resolved, That we advocate the adoption of the Australian ballot law, including the printing and distribution of ballots at public expense.

Resolved, That the best interests of Utah demand the defeat of all attempts to set aside the coming February election, and this convention respectfully petitions the Governor of the Territory to withhold his approval of the nefarious measure.

Resolved, That this convention does solemnly protest against the passage of either the so-called Faulkner or Teller bill through Congress as premature, unnecessary, ill-advised and undesired by a majority of the people and full of sinister omens of evil to the best interests of all classes in the Territory.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Liberal party are due to Mayor Scott for the faithfulness, ability, perfect integrity and untiring industry which he has manifested in the discharge of the duties of his trying office.

OBITUARY.

GREEN—Elder Cornelius Green departed this life on the 19th of January, 1892, at his residence in Mill Creek ward after an illness of many months. The cause of his protracted sickness was kidney disease.

Cornelius Green, son of Samuel Green and Hannah Nobel, was born February 10, 1828, at Britton, Gloucestershire, England. Baptized February 6, 1852, at Ebbs Vale, Monmouthshire, England, by Elder Gad Davis and confirmed at the same time. He was ordained an Elder January 23, 1858. Emigrated to Utah in the fall of 1855. He was ordained a Seventy September 15, 1859. Received an appointment for a mission to Europe May 21, 1867, and returned in 1869, having performed an honorable mission. Elder Green was a man of unwavering integrity and devotion to his religion. He was strictly an honest man, sober in habits, industrious in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord.

He died as he had lived, a staunch supporter of his faith and was highly esteemed by all who knew him, and passed away in full assurance of a glorious resurrection at the coming of Christ. He leaves a wife and two sons and five daughters to mourn his present loss.
