PAID \$1,000 Worth of Diamonds for \$7.

AN AGED WIFE ANKS DIVORCE.

Accused by a Neighbor—Important Land Decision—Dispensing with Facts.

The first cargo of sulphur from Japan to Puget Sound arrived at the latter place on Thursday, Oct. 9.

Donna McCarthy, who killed Gus Fox at Santa Rosa, Cal., last July, because he took a shine to the latter was convicted on Thursday of murder in the first degree, and is to be hanged.

Edward Day, of Wilkes, Wash., was carefully hammering an ornate looking piece of brass when a few days ago it suddenly parted into several pieces, exposing a beautiful agate stone over a quarter of an inch in diameter.

Six boxes of materials and tools from Berlin entered duty for the National Museum in Washington were shipped last week. They were ordered by the United States government, who wanted them during the past few months.

The \$1,000 diamonds carefully left by Miss Murray of Los Angeles on a washstand at the city hall there, have been recovered. They were picked up by a Mrs. E. G. O'Connell, who gave them to her husband, and who is now in possession of them.

Mary A. Black, aged 55, has been proceeding for divorce against James H. Black, her husband, aged 37, of Woodland, Cal., on the ground of habitual drunkenness. The couple were married in 1871, Mrs. Black having been a wealthy widow.

The will of the late General A. V. Kautz, of Seattle, Wash., is to be contested by two Puget Sound Indians, who claim General Kautz as their father. They say that when General Kautz was stationed at Fort Stevens, a lieutenant he lived with their mother, a full-blooded Puget Sound Indian, and that he never made any secret of the relationship. The younger half-brothers are August and Augustus Kautz, and they claim a share of the general's property, which was bequeathed to his widow and her two daughters. They are both bright and well educated, August being the industrial teacher at the Warm Springs reservation in Oregon.

August Lindstrom, a middle-aged man of fine appearance, and considerable means, who is a racing man on the subject of poison, made a desperate attempt to murder Jacob Pense at Ross station, near Seattle, Wash., Friday night. Lindstrom lived in a little cottage, and on the idea that Pense was trying to poison him through the roof of his cottage upon him. Armed with a knife, Lindstrom entered Pense's house, and attacked him and during the fracas the revolver was discharged, making a fatal wound on Lindstrom's hand. He then clubbed Pense and left him for dead. Pense managed to crawl to the police and summon help. Lindstrom offered no resistance when arrested, but was surprised that his supposed lieutenant still lived.

In accordance with the canon regulations of the sacred congregation of Rome, approved by the pope, Archbishop Harlan, of San Francisco, has sent a letter to the Catholic clergy instructing them to announce in all Catholic churches the designation of the working classes from abstention from flesh meat on all days of the year except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week and the Vigil of Christmas. Not alone is this privilege granted to the laity of the hierarchy, but all members are included. Others whose occupations in the judgment of the pastor seem to require flesh meat are accorded the same privilege. The new regulation dispenses with the obligation of fasting imposed on many days throughout the year, and is in accordance with the days of Lent with the exception of some four or five.

A decision against the Northern Pacific railway in a case involving over \$1,000,000 worth of agricultural and timber lands in the Gray's Harbor country, north of Aberdeen, Wash., has been rendered by the commissioner of the general land office. On June 5, 1894, the Northern Pacific railway received the lands in question, but prior to that date they had been sold upon by two private land owners. On June 20, 1894, the Oregonian officials were instructed to notify these owners that they would be allowed thirty days in which to enter the lands covered by their respective claims. All of the twenty-eight applications failed to meet the requirements of the law, and others made application to disprove the fact, the rights of the others having been forfeited. The railroad company claimed that as it had selected the lands prior to the application of the second lot of settlers, it was entitled to the land in the event of the original application being their right. The commissioner holds that the rights of the first applicants did not expire until July of this year, and that the railroad's selection made prior to that date would not hold. The commissioner awards to the land and reserves the right to give up to the law.
