Wanted \$1,000 Worth of Diamonds for \$7.

AN AGED WIFE ANNS DIVORCE.

Accused by a Maniac—Important Land Decision—Dispensing with Facts.

The first cargo of sulphur from Japan to Piguet arrived at the latter place on Thursday, Oct. 9.

Donna McCarthy, who killed Gen. Fox at Santa Rosa, Cal., last July, because he took a liking to the latter was sentenced Thursday of our era to the first degree, and is to be hanged.

Edward Day, of Wilkes, Wash., was carefully hammering an ornately looking piece of furniture a few days ago when it suddenly parted in several places, exposing a beautiful jewel some over a quarter of an inch in diameter.

The Mexican Herald during the past three months has for over two and a half million dollars gold have passed through Wells Fargo Express company who to purchase Mexican dollars for the Japanese government.

Six boxes of materials sent from the Dallas center of the National Museum in Washington were shipped last week. They were collected by the United States geologists, who examined them during the past few months.

The \$1,000 diamonds carefully left by Miss Murray of Los Angeles on a washstand in the city hall there, have been recovered. They were picked up by a Mrs. E. G. O'Connell, who saw them in her husband's, and who is now pursuing legal steps for it.

Mary A. Black, aged 55, has been proceeding for divorce against James H. Black, her husband, aged 37, of Woodland, Cal., on the ground of adultery. The divorce suit was filed in 1891, Mrs. Black having been a wealthy widow.

The will of the late General A. V. Knapp, of Seattle, Wash., is to be contested by two Puget Sound Indians, who claim General Knapp as their father. They say that when General Knapp was stationed at Fort Stevens, a Puget Sound Indian lived with their mother, a full-blooded Puget Sound Indian, and that he never made any secret of the relationship. The contesting parties are August and Augustus Knapp, and they will claim a share of the general's property, which was bequeathed to his widow and her two daughters. They are both bright and well educated, August being the industrial teacher at the Warm Springs reservation in Oregon.

August Lindstrom, a middle-aged man of fine appearance, and considerable means, who is a railway man on the subject, made a desperate attempt to murder Jacob Pass at Rose station, near Seattle, Wash., Friday night. Lindstrom lived in a little cottage, and got the idea that Pass was trying to pass poison through the roof of his cottage upon him. Charged with this crime, Lindstrom stood himself with a revolver and went to Pass's house. He attacked Pass and during the fracas the revolver was discharged, and a bullet wound on Lindstrom's head. He then clubbed Pass and left him for dead. Pass managed to crawl to the police and was rescued. Lindstrom offered no resistance when arrested, but was surprised that his supposed murderer still lived.

In connection with the recent resolution of the sacred congregations of Rome, approved by the pope, Archbishop Barron, of San Francisco, has sent a letter to the Catholic hierarchy instructing them to announce in all Catholic churches the dispensation of the working classes from abstinence from flesh meat on all days of the year except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week and the Vigil of Christmas. Not alone is this privilege granted to the laity, but all members of all churches are included. Others whose occupations in the judgment of the pastor seem to require flesh meat are exempted from the abstinence. The new regulation dispenses with the rigid fast of fasting imposed on many days preceding Lent, and includes all the days of Lent with the exception of some four or five.

A decision against the Northern Pacific railway in a case involving over \$1,000,000 worth of securities, and timber lands in the Gray's harbor country, north of Aberdeen, Wash., has been rendered by the commissioner of the general land office. On June 5, 1894, the Northern Pacific railway received the lands in question, but prior to that date, they had been sold again by treaty rights from the settlers. On June 20, 1895, the Olympia officers were instructed to notify these settlers that they would be allowed thirty days in which to enter the lands covered by their respective claims. All of the twenty-eight applicants failed to make application, and the P. N. R. and other made application to dispose of the land, the rights of the settlers having been forfeited. The railroad company claimed that as it had selected the lands prior to the application of the second lot of settlers, it was entitled to the land in the event of the original application being their right. The commissioner holds that the rights of the first applicants did not expire until July of this year, and that the railroad's selection made prior to that date would not hold. The commissioner awards to the settlers and reserves the right to give up to the law.
