FRAUDS IN MANILA MacArthur Says Reports are Exag-

erated and Misleading.

HAS MADE INVESTIGATION.

Washington, April 18 .- The following cablegram was made public today: Manila, Adjutant General, Washington.-With reference to your telegram of the 16th, press reports grossly exaggerated, misleading; matters therein touched upon regarding officers of subsistence department fully investigated. THE POSSESSION.

As already related, the face of the sandstone bluff having been completely eroded, exposed a series of well-defined veins or layers, containing enormous quantities of mineral. The deposit covers 1,140 acres, which the company has covered by nine lode claims and

seven placer locations.
