# DESPERATE FIGHT FOR A CRIMINAL

to Arrest a Woman.

Her House Had to be Burned Before She Could be Taken by the Officers.

Offman, Ill., Aug. 27.-Two men luffed, three wounded-two of them fatallyone woman wounded and her residence burned are the results of an all night battle between a mob and Mrs. Dr. C. W. Wright, who was accused of the murder of Bessie Salter, the 16-year-old daughter of a citizen of Gilman.

The dead are: John Myers, laborer, employed by Mrs. Dr. Wright.

Michael Ryan, deputy constable. Fatally wounded:

Lawrence Ryan, brother of the dead man, wounded in abdomen.

George Willoughby, citizen, shot through left lung. Mrs. Lr. C. W. Wright, shot through right shoulder, built taking downward

Mrs. Dr. Wright was about 50 years old. It is stated that she was formerly an actress. For some time she has been conducting a lying-in hospital on the outskirts of Colman.

About 10 o'clock in the evening the first act of the tragedy was enacted. It was precipitated by the investigation of the coroner's jury into the death of Bessle Suiter, a 16-year-old girl of Leonard, ill, who died in the hospital Friday night and was taken to her home in Leonard under cover of darkness early Saturday morning. No coffin was procured. She was wrapped up in an old blanket and a piece of carbet and bursed. After the jury had heard pet and buried. After the jury had heard the evidence of Clarence Saiter, father of the girl, the coroner came to the conclusion that it was injudicious to wait longer for Mrs. Wright's arrest, and a warrant was sworn out by the police magistrate for her arrest. Constant lice magistrate for her arrest. Consta-ble Nilstead, with a posse, went to the house to serve the warrant, about 10 o'clock last night. Mrs. Wright barred the door. The constables broke the outer door open and entered the darkened rooms. Michael Ryan was about to enter the door of the inner apartment when a shot rang out and he fell ment when a shot rang out and he fell dead. The constable made a nurried exit, and formed a picket line around the building. They fired into the building in the hope that the occupants would surrender, but without success. Finally it was determined to set fire to the building. The recent rains had so dampened its timbers that the fire would not catch, and after burning some outbuildings, the posse gave up the attempt and fell back to their original program of driving out Mrs. program of driving out Mrs. t. About 3 o'clock the family wright. About I o'cleck the family of Michael Ryan arrived. A mob of probably 250 people had gathered. Most of them were armed. The scenes of grief which followed the arrival of Ryan's wife and children fixed the crowd with fenzy. They seized dozens of bundles of straw, esturated them with petroleum, piled them against the front and sides of the so-called hospital and applied the torch. In a moment the place was a mass of flames. Shot after shot rang from the upper windows, and shet rang from the upper windows, and George Willoughby, a local representa-tive of the Standard Oil company, fell with a biullet in the left side. The next victime was Peter Hauer, a member of the attacking party. These casualties so angered the crowd that they volleyed the house as fast as they could load their fire arms. Contrary to expectations no screams followed the progress of the flames and the mob began to think that the immates of the burning house and been cremated. Suddenly, from a bunch of timber in the reat, sev-eral shots came in the direction of the mob. They were, however, a hundred to one and the fire was quickly altenced. Members of the mob rushed to the tim-ber and in the dim light of the comiss dawn, found the body of John Myers, blacksmith, who had been employed b

American Gold Saved Discount Rates Temporarily Stagnation on the London Stock Exchange.

New York, Aug. 27.—The Times financial correspondent ways:

The American gold, which has been arriving all week, has again been the chief factor in governing discount rates. These, in the early part of the week, steadily slipped back, although they received a temporary check from the announcement made last Saturday of £1,000,000 In treasury wills paid off on the 15th, and £1.58,000 notaring on the 50th.
